

CONGRESSMAN PORTER DIES EARLY TODAY

Brilliant Career Ends Following Illness Of Two Months.

PITTSBURGH, June 27. (AP)—The brilliant career of Stephen G. Porter, one of the nation's foremost statesmen, is ended. Mr. Porter died early today while messages of sympathy and condolence poured in from all over the world. Members of his family were at the bedside.

The children of the house of representatives foreign affairs committee, leader in the world-wide fight for control of habit-forming drugs, and dean of the Pennsylvania congressional delegation, slipped into unconsciousness early yesterday and sank rapidly.

Mr. Porter became ill about two months ago, while aboard ship enroute from London. June 11 he was brought to Pittsburgh from Walter Reed hospital in Washington. Death was due to cirrhosis of the liver.

Representative Porter was 52 years old. He was a prominent figure in republican politics of Pennsylvania for the past 20 years and became a national figure at the close of the world war, while congress and the nation sought solution to the gigantic problems growing out of that conflict.

Sponsored Diplomat Bill After the treaty of Versailles was signed, Mr. Porter took a leading part in the conference which resulted in the Knox-Porter resolutions, forming the basis for restoring diplomatic and commercial relations with Germany and Austria-Hungary.

During the world war President Wilson frequently consulted Mr. Porter on American war policies and President Harding likewise asked his aid in handling post-war problems.

Passage of Bill
Committee Favors

PORTLAND, June 27. (AP)—The chamber of commerce learned today that the bill for a branch of the National Soldiers' Home in the Pacific Northwest drew nearer to final passage yesterday when it was favorably reported to the senate by a subcommittee, consisting of senators McMaster, South Dakota and Steak of Iowa.

The subcommittee had been authorized by the full committee to make the report direct to the senate.

Passage of the measure in the form in which it was adopted by the house, with provision for a survey and selection of a site by the board of managers of the National Soldiers' Home which is understood to lead strongly to Roseburg, was recommended by the subcommittee.

Senator McNary, who has been watching the bill in the senate, said he believed it may be passed Friday.

ASK LAW AMENDMENT
SALT, Ore., June 27. (AP)—C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, says he will ask the next legislature to amend the labor law so the commissioner may enforce employers to pay just wage claims of workers. A similar bill was defeated in 1929. Gram indicated that many of the offending employers are not permanent residents of the state.
