gress a short time ago all Indians were declared American citizens with full rights which automatically brought their children under the general school system.

Experience Recognized
"We have adopted a salary schedule," said Superintendent Peterson, "which recognizes experience and training by paying a little more for the trained teacher. We are positive that the best teachers should be in the rural districts but to get and keep them there is a problem. Only by paying a premium for the best can this be approached at all. Teachers in the one and two room schools are hard to obtain but they are very needed."

"To attract good teachers, we have created comfortable living quarters in about twenty districts where small rentals are charged the teachers for these living rooms."

Operate 16 Busses
"We operate sixteen school busses at a cost of approximately \$100 per month per bus, which includes depreciation and charging off the price of the bus in six years. More than \$50 pupils are served by the busses. This is economy, for without bus service we would be compelled to hire about sixteen more teachers and erect several new school plants."

"All supplies are purchased by bid and we furnish everything to the pupil except text books. We find more economy among the children if they know the district

is furnishing their supplies.
"Six cafeterias are operated by the district and we have eight high schools in the district system. Our bonded debt is at present \$378,000, nearly all buildings are new and we feel we are in excellent condition. Our success reflects in the fact that the rate-per pupil is less now than a few years ago. We can't take too much credit for this however, as the increase in population in the county has aided this situation."

Charles Martin, vice president of the club, was in the chair in the absence of President Underwood who is in the east attending the national Rotary convention. He introduced Howard Perlin who presided. A wire was read from Major Underwood stating that national Rotary meeting was a great success and that A. Rose of Palo Alto had been chosen national president. A letter was read from Walt Biehn from Paris. He told of his trip across the pond and of the interesting things he is seeing in the Old World.

Loe Brothers of
Hildebrand Lose
Valuable Cattle

As a result of an investigation carried on by Sheriff Lloyd L. Low, seven head of full grown, pure-bred Hereford cattle, belonging to Loe Brothers of Hildebrand, were found dead in a meadow on the Loe range. The cattle had apparently come down off the hills to water, and had only gone a little way back, when they dropped dead without a struggle.

Dr. E. C. Howell, veterinarian, accompanied Sheriff Low, and examined the cattle, removing portions of their stomachs to be sent away for analysis.

No solution of the mysterious deaths of the valuable cattle has been suggested, save the possibility that they might have eaten some poisonous weed. The sheriff thinks it highly probable that more of the Loe Brothers' stock may have died in the same strange manner.

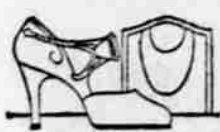
