

### TRULMANS AND LANGFORD SET FOR KNOCKOUT

Both Fighters Ready to Give Fans Thrill at Legion Pavilion.

Next Wednesday night Klamath Falls fight fans and '49 visitors will be entertained by a real he-man fight when Al Trulmans and Young Sam Langford, colored, tangle in the six round main event. These two boys met on the last card in the semi-final and for four rounds slammed and socked each other around like nobody's business. The bout ended in a foul suddenly when Al unluckily hit Sam low and Sam was awarded the fight following an examination. A few days later Trulmans journeyed to Portland where he and Lou Sauer stole the show with headlines like Ratslaff and McQuillan showing.

**Sam Still Young**  
Sam has been fighting for several years but is still in what you might call his "flaming youth" and although a veteran, is a youngster. He has fought Young Jack Thompson, present champ, twice, Young Corbett, Al Gracie, Baby Joe Gans and many others just as tough. He has never failed to please in his Klamath fights and has always given the fans his best.

**Losses One On Four**  
Al Trulmans has had over 30 fights and only lost one and that was the foul to Sam. He can box but owes only on the rarest of occasions. He loves to mix and is as cool as a cucumber in the heat of battle and he hits like Babe Ruth. At the present time he is the coast's sensation and in constant demand. Joe was fortunate in signing him for the first fight and had it ended any other way than in a foul we would have missed seeing this boy in action the second time. Don't miss seeing this fight.

**Two Favorite Heavies**  
In the semi-windup two local heavies will fight it out for the championship of Klamath valley. These boys have met on only one occasion and that ended in a draw and was fought in Medford. These two boys are well known and liked. Tiny McCumber is the tall lanky one with the Dempsey punch and the other is the boy who calls them, Dick Reed. Dick is the tough aggressive type that doesn't know what it is to quit. He keeps crowding in and socks hard enough to K. O. a man.

Tiny has fought most of his fights here as has Dick. His hand is completely healed and he promises to let it go with everything behind it. Dick Reed is the only man Tiny has fought he couldn't floor. All others were on the floor for the count sometime during the fight and most of them for 10.

**Rosy Coming Back**  
Austin Rosander and Battling Burns mix in the feature bout of the card. Rosander was signed for the main event against Dave Jackson but was kidnapped a few days before the fight and now is fighting his way back to a top spot again. He was Klamath Falls' greatest audience pleaser when he was fighting regularly. Burns is improving with every start and is as tough as shoe-leather. This should be as good as many top spots. Gus Eaton the darkest man on the card and that includes Sam Langford, meets a Dorrie light-heavy by the name of Pat McCoy. Pat better be good because Gus says, "I've been fooling up to now, but now I'm going to eat 'em up just like chicken." Finley Wilson and Jockey Powers open the fights.

### CRATER LAKE LODGE OPENS

Road Conditions Enable Hostelry to Greet Public Earlier.

Crater Lake Lodge, Richard "Dick" Price's famous hostelry at Crater Lake rim, opened to the public early this year. Whereas the lodge usually opens on July 1, Mr. Price this year opened it June 26.

The cafeteria was opened nearly two weeks earlier for the convenience of the thousands of visitors who daily flock to the "Jewel of the Cascades," an hour and a half's ride north of Klamath Falls.

**40,000 See Lake**  
Already this year more than 40,000 visitors have visited the park. Superintendent E. C. Sollinsky states, "Roads to the park were cleared of snow in May and the removal of the snow allowed the crews to have the roads in the best of condition a month ago."

**Concessions Open**  
All concessions at the Lake rim will open July 1. Mr. Price states and by July 3 when the great Days of '49 celebration which is expected to draw thousands of visitors to Klamath County opens, the lodge and concessions will be running full blast. ### WHISKERLESS MEN HAULED BEFORE JUDGE

Kangaroo Court Finds Many Excuses for Fixing Fines.

A feature of the pre-celebration days was the Kangaroo Court which has been held each Saturday night since June 1 at the steps of the Elks Temple.

Principal offenders brought before the court were the men of the city who refused or were unable to grow a crop of whiskers.

"The Whisker Patrol," a truck with an old fashioned fire bell in the rear, was used by Chief of Whisker Police, Dale Mattoon to round up and bring in the victims.

**Many Charges Fined**  
So successful was the Kangaroo Court that many additional charges were placed against the prisoners, such as being late to court, growing more whiskers on the face than on the head, perjury for pleading guilty without knowing the charge, charged with soda water, with being a Californian, for wearing suspenders, failure to wear costume, for objecting to whiskers.

Many unpopular judges were recalled during the courts, and many prominent citizens were hauled before the court while the judge read their sentence from a mail order company's catalog which was used for a lawbook and a reference for charges.

The jangling of the bell on the "Whisker Patrol" wagon became such a usual happening that even the most suspicious persons were soon easy to catch, Dale Mattoon states.

Dangerous to smoke While Travelling On Forest, Brush, or Grass Land Smoke Only  
1. While Stopping in a Safe

Place Clear of All Inflammable Material, or  
2. During or Right After Heavy Rain, or  
3. Inside a Vehicle on Two-way Highways, or  
4. Above Timber Line, and After Smoking  
Put Out All Lighted Material. The law prohibits throwing away any burning matches or tobacco, or other lighted material in a forest region.
