

TWELVE ACRE VILLAGE BUILT FOR BIG SHOW

Replica of Mining Town To Be Center of Four-Day Celebration.

A complete '49 village, surrounded by a log stockade with peepholes in the wall and musket muzzles sticking ominously through, has been erected in Klamath Falls for the Days of '49, July 3, 4, 5 and 6.

The village is located on Klamath avenue between First and Third streets.

Tents, Log Houses

Log fronts, shacks, "rag houses" as tents were called in '49, and stands not even shaded from the sun are interspersed along the street which as in most mining towns is not "laid out" but just "grew up over night."

12 Acres in Stockade

Twelve acres are included within the stockade and throughout the 12 acres something will be going on from 7 p. m. to — each night, July 4th the stockade gates will swing open at 1 p. m. and will close later—much later.

Pay Sreak Trail

Pay Sreak Trail, the hub around which every activity of the celebration will center, is in the form of a cross section, and here the high lights of the big show are located—The Last Chance saloon, the Pot of Gold, The Gambling Hall, the Girlie-Girlie show, and other adjuncts of life when "the west was woolly" will be operated.

The entrance to the '49 village will be a picture in itself of early days. Constructed entirely of logs the portals will take the form of a blockade, and will be perforated with slots out of which rifles bristle menacingly.

Along the top of the parapet, surmounting the portal, an armed patrol will march during the celebration. This arrangement is just attention to detail in the everyday life of the frontiersman.

A spirit of home-like welcome will prevail throughout the entire celebration. Formality will be cast into discard and joy is to reign supreme four days and four nights.

"Klamath Falls welcomes the whole wide world" is a message pregnant with the sincerity of the old west, sent out by each and every member of the two organizations sponsoring the celebration.

Mayor Issues Proclamation To Grow Beards

PROCLAMATION

June 4th, 1930

Whereas, Klamath Falls Lodge, No. 1247 B. P. O. Elks and Klamath Falls American Legion Post No. 3, are preparing for and promoting a celebration to be staged in this city from July 3rd to 6th, inclusive, to be known as "THE DAYS OF '49" such celebration to depict in every way possible the personal habits and customs of those sturdy pioneers, and

Whereas, the Klamath Falls lodge of Elks and American Legion has always been among the first in support of all that has been for the betterment of the city and the welfare of the community.

Now, therefore, having these things in mind, be it resolved that the city of Klamath Falls join with the Klamath Falls Elks and Legion in commemorating those sturdy days of '49, and that all male citizens of the city allow their whiskers to grow and refrain from shaving during the period from this date until July 6th 1930 at the hour of 12 midnight.

Done in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, this 4th day of June, 1930.
