

PARADE WILL FEATURE OLD TIME TRAVEL

Gas Cars Under Ban in
Program for July
4th Spectacle.

Depicting the old time wagon trains in which the hardy pioneers of the Gold Rush days crossed the plains, overcoming all hardships, fighting Indians to gain their way westward and finally reaching their "chosen" land, the three-mile parade on July 4th will surprise any previous event held here, in the opinion of the parade committee.

No automobiles or motor vehicles of any type or kind will be allowed in the line of march. Covered wagons, bands, stage coaches, chuck wagons, Indians in native costumes, pony express riders, side saddle riders, burro packs, old prospectors, woodsmen, a cowboy band, prairie cattle, Indian scouts, many women attired in the old time dresses and bonnets, dance hall girls, Spanish beauties, ox teams, line riders, a comic section, and men dressed as the pioneers will form the parade.

Everybody Invited
Many organizations will march en masse in costumes and all citizens of this section who wish are invited to enter and bring any kind of rig, conveyance or entry they wish which conforms to the style of the early days.

Moving pictures of the three-mile long, colorful pageant reminiscent of the wagon trains which crossed the rugged plains before roads had been marked or mapped will be taken by the Pathe News Reel cameraman.

Scouts Head Parade
Captain O. C. Applegate, famous Indian scout and well known throughout the state, with Colonel William Thompson of Alturas, also a well known pioneer and Indian scout, will lead the parade.

Colonel Thompson and Captain Applegate were associates in the Modoc Indian war of 1872 and 1873. Several years ago Col. Thompson and Captain Applegate were aids to the late Ezra Meeker at Eugene at the Oregon Trail celebration.

Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Emmitt, who came here in 1870, will be honored by a special place near the head of the parade and next to Captain Applegate and Col. Thompson. The Legion Auxiliary will dress in costume and act as an escort to Mr. and Mrs. Emmitt.

Bolivian Joan of Arc Among Slain In Liberty Riots

LIMA, Peru, June 28. (AP).—Spurred by the martyrdom of a beautiful young Bolivian girl, who with stirring words had urged the men of La Paz to be men and strike in defense of their liberties, a mob in that city Sunday waged a vain and deadly battle with police.

Gendarmes, mounting machine guns on trucks, repulsed wave after wave of enraged citizens, until finally forty or more lay dead on the streets of the mountain capital and more than 60 lay wounded.

Bodies Exhibited
The demonstrators then took the bodies of the girl and a boy student companion whom the police also killed and carried them to every part of the city, exhibiting them as evidence of what was called an outrage perpetrated by those whose duty was to defend. Again Monday when a public burial was sought for the dead the police dispersed the crowds with gun fire and others were killed and wounded. Public excitement grew and continues.

WOMEN LEND INFLUENCE TO CELEBRATION

Don Garb of Early Day
And Live Part in
Realistic Style.

Not to be outdone by the men of the city with whiskers, overalls or tight-fitting trousers, flat-heeled boots, revolvers in holsters, flat-topped, broad-brimmed hats, and colorful shirts, the women of the city returned to the winsome costumes of their predecessors of '49 in conspicuous numbers.

With the same spirit in which the men have grown whiskers, donned the rough garb of the 49ers and swaggered under the weight of side arms, the women of Klamath Falls have dug into old trunks, borrowed hither and thither, bought up yards and yards of old time materials, which they have fashioned into the styles of 30 years ago, and some sent to costumers for gowns like their great grandmothers wore.

It has been more than surprising what they've found to wear as companions to the men of '49 here in this district, in which there are scarcely any attics or other treasure houses to yield up relics of the earliest pioneers. However and wherever they came from the full skirts, sweeping the ground, plain bodices, long, plain sleeves, lace mitts, bonnets, short capes and big shawls are the vogue for today's women of '49.

They are wearing these early day clothes on the street to their work, to social affairs.

Women are finding that giving their whole hearted support to the big celebration planned by their men is really a glorious form of play.

As the business days opened girls working in stores and offices all arrived at work in the old time costumes. Some of them donned ruffles and tight basques.

La Grande Paper In New Quarters

LA GRANDE, June 28. (AP).—The La Grande Evening Observer will hold the formal opening of its new building tonight and Saturday. PROSPECTOR TO PAN GOLD IN OLD WAY

Picturesque Setting to
Be Laid for Unusual
Mining Exhibit.

Among the many interesting displays of historic interest along Pay Streak Trail in the '49 Village during the "Days of '49" July 3, 4, 5, and 6 will be the old time mining display.

H. Phillips, old time prospector and miner, will operate the old eraser, (rock crusher) and also pan real gold from rich dirt, in a most picturesque setting.

A log cabin will be constructed and furnished, an exact replica of that day so long ago and visitors will have a peep into the past when they view this unique setting.

A stream of water rushing past the cabin door will give the old prospectors their chance to pan real gold and the new generation will see, probably for the first time and last time, this operation which is fast becoming a lost art and vanishing with many other modes and traditions of the treacherous but lovable old west.

Pay dirt was brought in from Yreka, California, mines and will be panned in the '49 Village. Samples of the gold will be sold as souvenirs during the celebration.

George Walton was in charge of arranging the display and getting the pay dirt for Mr. Phillips, who was in the Klondike rush in '97 and has been a prospector and miner for years.

Crop Failure Aid To Price of Hops

YAKIMA, Wash., June 28. (A.P.)—Due to widespread crop failure in Oregon, Western Washington and British Columbia, complete reversal in the hop market has occurred in the Yakima valley almost overnight.

With prices having jumped five cents, active trading is being carried on at from 12 to 14 cents a pound. Four growers were said to control the remaining 1400 bales of the 1929 production. This year's valley crop estimates were placed at 15,000 bales in comparison to 23,000 last year.
