

LARGE PURSES ATTRACT MANY PRIZE HORSES

More Than 75 Head of
Coast's Best Train on
Local Track.

Over \$4,000 in purses and \$500 for the Derby has been put up for the Klamath Horse Show and race meet, the largest in the northwest. Thousands of lovers of horse-flesh are expected from all over the Pacific coast, and farther east.

More than 75 horses have arrived in Klamath Falls, and are working out every day in preparation for the big races.

Satiny thoroughbreds, their blue-blood fairly shining through their skins, are stabled at the Klamath County fairgrounds awaiting the three days' racing program, July 4, 5, and 6.

World famous jumpers, as well as some of the fastest of racing stock will be shown at the Klamath horse show and race meet during the days of '49.

Famous Jumpers Come
Some of the famous horses that have arrived in this city are: "Postman," "Flying Fox," "Tony Dundee," "Kentucky Bob," which are all well-known winners. Ten horses owned by members of the Portland Hunt Club have been entered for the races, as well as two racers from Salem.

Other horses stabled at the fair grounds are Shute, a well-known favorite that has raced all over the United States; Lost Boy, a two-year old Alturas horse, well known in the west; Beany, a winner from the Tia Juana track, a beautiful sorrel gelding that is expected to give a good account of itself.

Three newcomers who may change racing history this season are also in their stalls at the fair grounds, Tula Mouse, Goldie and Tip Top.

One of the outstanding horses to arrive for the meet is Good Enough who has raced and won in events all over the country. This horse was bred and raised in the east. After a while is a Canadian bred horse but owned by an Oregonian. This horse is royal bred by Yorkshire Lad.

Glenmore, an Illinois horse, a big rangy bay, has a good reputation among the racing fraternity. Myrtle Snow, a chestnut brown filly, and Bob Messenger, a beautiful dappled gray, a big favorite, is now owned by Ranch Horse. Glenmore and Myrtle Snow are both owned by Al Ames.

Alta Palm, famous running horse of the west coast from Tia Juana to Canada, owned by Jockey Ames. Infatigable, bought in Reno last fall by George Stewart, has a big reputation. Aollator, is a mighty good looking race animal.

Purses of more than \$4000 have been hung up by the racing committee.

Parade Daily
Each day before the races a parade of the prize horses will be held before the grand stand. A new 30-stall racing barn is nearing completion to take care of the large numbers of blooded animals entered for the horse show which will be a daily feature.

Dr. J. H. Held's world's famous jumpers, which are entered in only the largest shows throughout the country, have been entered and are here for the show.

No advance in admission will be made. It is stated, but one admission will be charged to the baseball game, the races, the horse show and the grandstand.

Grounds Improved
Local race fans will hardly recognize the fair grounds and race track when they attend the largest horse show, race meet, and celebration ever held in Klamath, July 3, 4, 5 and 6.

All rodeo pens and shutes have been removed and the center field is now free and clear of all obstructions.

Fences are whitewashed and many new stables have been constructed.

The grounds will be sprinkled daily to keep down dust and all in all the changes make an attractive place for the setting of the Klamath Horse Show and Racing Meet.

Building Here More Rapid Than Permits Show

On account of the comparatively small area covered by the city limits of Klamath Falls, building in the community is more rapid than the building permits indicate, as there are several suburban districts adjoining the city, but just outside the limits, which are just as active, some of them even more so, than the additions within the city.

A. H. Hickman, manager for Westover Terraces, Klamath Falls' new suburban district, reports the sale of four lots upon which residences will be constructed immediately. He also states that several other lots have been sold, and that they will be improved before fall.

Mr. Hickman is daily receiving inquiries regarding Westover Terraces, and that all of the inquiries are from persons who contemplate buying for home purposes exclusively.

The California Oregon Power company has commenced the laying of six inch water mains across the highway, and on Cumberland Road, and the entrance into the tract will soon be graded and rockbed.

The balance of the pipe needed for the extension of the mains into Westover Terraces will arrive within a few days. This extension of the city water mains into Westover Terraces represents a large investment as it will require over 3000 feet of six inch mains, exclusive of the labor of digging the ditches and the laying of the mains.

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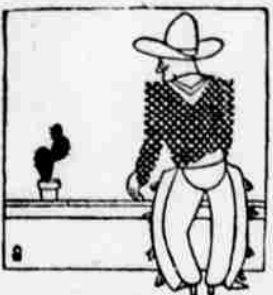
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Many to Visit Klamath During Big Celebration
