Crippled Cub Team Battles Way to Top, Wrestling First Place Honors From Brooklyn

A somewhat crippled Cub team lacking Rogers Hornsby and occasionally a few other regulars, has been battling its way upward through the National league and finally has wrestled first place from the Brooklyn Robins. The Cubs have refused to be downed, and even losing the first game of their series to the Robins failed to daunt them. They came back to capture the league lead yesterday by beating Brooklyn, 5 to 1.

The Cubs now have 11 of their last 13 games, starting when they played their last game in New York before returning home.

Full Game Lead These victories have placed them a full game ahead of the Robins. Their lead is only nine percentage points, due to the fact that they have played four more games than the Robins. In addition they set a record for attendance in the series with Brooklyn, drawing 47,000 fans yesterday to bring the total of 140,000 for the series.

Brooklyn made it a sad celebration of Manager Wilbert Robinson's 65th birthday by getting only seven hits off Charley Root.

Cards Rejoice The St. Louis Cardinals and Boston Braves had almost as much cause for rejoicing as the Cubs yesterday.

The Cards picked up two full games on the New York Giants. Winding up only one game out of three place by winning a pair of close decisions. The scores were 3 to 2 and 5 to 4. Sylvester Johnson and Bill Halahan held the Giants to a total of eleven hits in the two games.

Jimmy Foxx's 22nd home run of the year, which kept him just ahead of Lou Gehrig, who hit his 21st for the Yankees, was the big feature with the final decision at the plate adding more excitement. The Tigers scored two runs in the ninth and the fans thought they had a third but Umpire Guthrie said out instead of safe when Jimmy Shevlin tried to score.

The league's tail enders, Boston and Chicago, divided a double header. The Red Sox made it eight straight over their Chicago rivals by taking the first, 10 to 5, but the white horse reversed the decision, 2 to 1, in the second game as Ted Lyons bested Jack Russell to gain his 49th victory of the season.
