Butter and egg prices opened the week unchanged. The demand was ordinary.

Butter receipts were liberal over the week-end. Trade was quiet, many dealers having bought requirements. Local storage holdings were increased 56,140 pounds to 539,932 pounds compared with 88,191 pounds at same time a year ago.

Egg receipts for the week exceeded the previous week's receipts slightly. Storage holdings increased 1510 cases, bringing the total to 56,485 cases compared with 48,759 cases a year ago.

Fresh fruit and vegetable prices were generally steady with last week's ranges. New potatoes were more plentiful and sold down a half cent, ranging from 3 1/2 to 4 cents a pound.
