HUNTER BROTHERS may fly until July 4th. That would be celebrating with a "21st old time."

WITH official census showing 301,311 people in the city, and 437,316 in the city area, Portland has no more cause for gloom.

MR. J. F. Fish, of Chicago, has regained his eyesight after 50 years of blindness. Reviewing things as they are now as compared with what he saw in 1880, he says: "And yet with all these new things people do not seem happier now than they were in 1880."

OF the 11,776 soldier loans made by the state only \$33 pieces of property have been foreclosed. Those who thought Oregon would go bankrupt because of the soldier loan law were wrong.

THERE will be an anti-cigarette law bill on the state ballot. You may not like cigarettes, but those who circulated the petitions to have such a bill on the ballot have lost their time. No such law will carry in Oregon.

ANSWERING the final roll-call which has been going on of late in the state at a rapid rate, Dr. J. W. Donnelly, receiver of The Dalles land office, has passed on.

"Doc" Donnelly was a prominent man of Central Oregon and he will be missed. His connection with Clifton, Arlington and The Dalles lasted from the time he came up from Tennessee and chose Oregon as his state. He was a good friend and a useful man.

IT is a good idea to exercise caution during the Days of '49 celebration. The promiscuous use of firearms, even in fun, is apt to lead to trouble and someone may pay for the fun with a lot of suffering. Klamath Falls is on the verge of staging one of the biggest celebrations in the history of Southern Oregon. That fun and entertainment for the vast crowds be provided is highly desirable, and everything to that end is being prepared by the committee. But there is a limit to which certain things may be carried and in the case of firearms it is perhaps just as well that they be dispensed with except for those characters in the parade on the 4th who will need the guns to make their '49 outfits complete. Prohibition Director Joins Repeal Forces

DRY AGENT RESIGNS AT NEW YORK

Major Campbell Says 18th Amendment Is Not Logical

PUBLICLY DECLARES FOR REPEAL OF LAW

Prohibition Administrator of New York District for Four Years, Campbell Arrives at Conclusion That Law Is Mistake and Unenforceable Due to Political Interference.

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—Major Maurice Campbell, until today prohibition administrator for New York, advocates the repeal of the eighteenth amendment.

He resigned when ordered to Boston to take charge of alcohol permits under the treasury department is the reorganization of the prohibition forces which transferred enforcement to the department of justice.

His declaration for repeal of the eighteenth amendment was part of a statement published today in which he charged that his transfer to Boston resulted from refusal to grant or restore brewery, whiskey and alcohol permits which "local politicians and certain administration officials in Washington feel must be restored to secure necessary support for the republican ticket in New York this fall."

Sorry for Successor Referring to William B. Moss, who has been transferred from the post of prohibition administrator at Albany, N. Y., to take charge of alcohol permits in New York, Campbell said: (Continued on Page Ten)

HOOVER FINDS TIMES BETTER

Building Program Ahead Of Boom Year of 1929 He Tells Governors

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—President Hoover says "important results" have attended the administration's effort to expand public construction as a means of stabilizing business and the next six months promise "even greater" things.

He made those assertions in an address of greeting to the governors conference at Salt Lake City, spoken by radio last night from his study in the White House.

Congratulating and thanking the state executives for their response to his request for increased building, he said he had been informed by the commerce department the total of such construction for the first six months of 1930 had not been less than \$1,700,000,000.

This figure, he added, exceeds "even the boom year of 1929 by over \$200,000,000. Construction operations undertaken by public utilities, he reported, reached a total of more than \$200,000,000.

Two Die in Wreck Near McMinnville

McMinnville, July 1 (AP)—Marie Rogers, 22, Portland and Clifford Ward, 24, Los Angeles, were killed and two men and another woman were injured in an automobile accident south of here on the West Side Pacific highway, today.

The injured are: Clinton Parker, Portland, bruises and lacerations; Max George, Portland, driver of the car, skull fractured; Miss Helen Johnson, Portland, who physicians said possibly would die.

The automobile belonged to Mrs. E. J. D. Peake, Congress hotel, Portland. Ward was her chauffeur.

Carter, the least injured, told McMinnville authorities George was driving the automobile to Portland after a pleasure trip, and attempted to make a turn in the road. He said the machine left the highway, turned over and crashed into a tree.

Carter said he leaped from the automobile, but the others were caught in the sedan and crushed. Miss Johnson and George were in a hospital here.

Eastern Oregon Man Favored For Governor's Race

PENDLETON, July 1 (AP)—Nine committees from eastern Oregon's 13 districts met last night to discuss various phases of the political situation in the state without emphasis on any special candidate. It was agreed, however, that an eastern Oregon man should be selected to head the republican party at the fall election.

A resolution recommended the state chairman select The Dalles as the meeting place for the state committee this month due to its central location.

Other resolutions were: Committees should not pledge their vote to any candidate prior to the state meeting, that a place outside of Multnomah county should be selected.

42ND GANG VICTIM

CHICAGO, July 1 (AP)—The body of a man, dead of bullet wounds, was found on the bank of the Desplaines river today near Riverside. He was apparently an Italian, and police believe he was a gangster, making number 42 on the growing casualty list of the year's gang wars.

SCARBURG BODY FOUND

ST. HELENS, July 1 (AP)—The body of a man found in Slousson creek, Northern Clark county, Washington, today was identified as that of E. B. Scarburg, missing from this city since March. Scarburg disappeared with R. H. Schuch, who has never been found.

Virginian Senator Takes Up Cause of Young Constituent

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—Senator Carter Glass, of Virginia, was attempting today to take some of the teeth out of navy regulations so a constituent of his, Bruce Old, 13 year old Norfolk boy, might enter the naval academy.

Young Old, described as a fine specimen, passed his entrance test by an exceptionally good mark, making 3.6 out of a possible four points, but he was rejected because he had not grown all of his second set of teeth.

Senator Glass took the matter up with Secretary Adams. The latter made no promises.

Denouncing what he termed the "idiotic regulations" Glass said today:

"Have things so changed in the navy that you now fight battles with your mouth? Do you expect to go out and bite the enemy?"

KIRK HELD FOR INVESTIGATION

Probable That Federal Government Will Probe Case

Clayton Kirk, 50-year-old Indian, is being held for investigation as the result of the killing of Louis Knight in the Klamath Marsh Monday morning. The verdict brought back by the coroner's jury as the result of the inquest held at the Agency today, recommended that Kirk be held. Since the shooting occurred on Indian land, and between two Indians, the federal government will probably make the investigation.

Harry D. Bolvin, assistant district attorney, and Earl Whitlock, county coroner, conducted the inquest and also conducted an investigation of the matter yesterday afternoon, securing a statement and confession from Kirk.

The killing followed upon a drunken fight between Louis Knight and his ex-wife, Amy Knight. Clayton Kirk is still in the hospital, although not seriously injured.

The coroner's jury was composed of Arthur Prilau, Ed Doran, Damon Savage, LeRoy Getinger, Jack Almetzer and Harry Davis.

Witnesses called included Dr. O. E. Patterson, Amy Knight, Letitia Kirk daughter of Clayton Kirk, Joseph Kirk and James Johnson.

ADMITTED TO CITIZENSHIP.

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—Declaring that an applicant for citizenship has the right to follow his conscience and religious scruple regarding the bearing of arms, the United States court of appeals has ordered that the Rev. Dr. Douglas Clyde Macintosh, professor of theology at Yale Divinity School, and Miss Marie Averil Bland be admitted to citizenship.

ANNOUNCES APPOINTMENT.

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—President Hoover announced today he had appointed Lieutenant General Edgar Jadwin as chairman of the newly created federal power commission, the other members of which are yet to be appointed, will supersede the present agency constituted of three members of the cabinet serving ex-officio. The affairs now will be conducted by the independent commission.

FEES PAID PROMPTLY SALEM, Ore., July 1 (AP)—The office of State Corporation Commissioner McAllister is deluged with checks covering the annual fee payments of Oregon corporations, due July 1. The bulk of the payments are received each year during June, with the combined July and August payments about equal to those of June. Penalty for delayed payments is not imposed until after August 15.

Admiral Beatty Flays British Participation In Armament Conference

LONDON, July 1 (AP)—Earl Beatty, admiral of the fleet, attacked the London naval treaties vigorously in the House of Lords today. He declared England was the only nation under the treaty that made any disarmament or reduction of its sea strength.

Admiral Beatty told the Lords that Britain was obliged to make such reduction that she was rendered impotent and incapable of maintaining control over the various parts of her farflung empire.

Others Expand Navies "In the United States," Earl Beatty said, "the conference has had the result of increasing their armaments in cruisers by no less than 225,000 tons."

"Japan is increasing her cruiser tonnage by ten percent. France is not restricted in any way. She has built three 10,000-ton cruisers. She is building three more and has authorized another ten."

U. S. Not Considered Continuing, Earl Beatty said that in all the calculations at the admiralty they never had taken the United States into consideration.

"Indeed, the admiralty were ordered not to do so in the formulating their requirements. It was recognized that if she (the United States) wished to build up to our standard she could do so without causing us any anxiety whatever."

"To provide protection against naval attacks on the part of the United States was not to form a part of our scheme of defense. It was completely out of the question."

Oregon Stands Near Top In Forestry Allotments

SALEM, July 1 (AP)—State Forester Lynn F. Cronmiller was informed today by the United States forest service that the federal Clarke-McNary allotment to the state for the fiscal year beginning today is \$99,045. This fund is paid to the state in recognition of federal responsibility in the protection of state and privately owned timber lands from fire.

Oregon stands near the top, Cronmiller said, in the amount of federal funds allotted to the states for the reason that the forestry system in Oregon most nearly complies with the objects of the Clarke-McNary act.

The allotment is on the basis of state expenditures on a fifty-fifty basis. The allotments to the various fire patrol associations in the state are:

Chicago Detectives And Los Angeles Police Effect Capture

QUINTET BOOKED ON MURDER SUSPICION

Los Angeles Authorities Now Hold Six People in Connection With the Murder of Alfred (Jake) Lingle, Chicago Reporter, Including Woman Alleged to Be Foster's Wife.

LOS ANGELES, July 1 (AP)—Frankie Foster, suspected of implication in the Chicago killing of Jake Lingle, Tribune reporter, and four of his fellow gangsters, were under arrest and booked on charges of suspicion of the murder here today. All were captured last night when they walked into police traps, set in two apartment houses under the leadership of two Chicago detectives.

The gangsters are: Frankie Foster, alias Frank Foreman; Marvin Agler, alias Hart; Frankie Fisher, George Davis and Herman Walters.

Woman in Custody A woman, who at first was tentatively identified as Foster's wife, is in technical custody. Her arrest yesterday in an apartment house, where she had registered under the name of Mrs. Frank (Continued on Page Ten)
