

FOSTER AND 4 PALS ARRESTED

Chicago Detectives And
Los Angeles Police
Effect Capture

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Bowman of Chicago, led to the capture of the gangster. Foster and Apier were surrounded by police detectives with all means of escape cut off, when they came to the young woman's apartment house shortly after midnight. The other three were arrested as they entered an apartment building at 11th and Main. This building also had been filled with hiding detectives. The arrests were made without a shot being fired.

Forward Finger Prints
Pat Roche, special agent in Chicago, directing the search for Lingo's slayers, was notified of the arrests. He telephoned Police Detective Captain Joe Taylor to forward finger prints of the gangsters.

The Chicago detectives, led by Leo M. Anderson and John Scherping, had been here two weeks searching for Foster, who once owned the gun with which Lingo was killed.

They identified Apier, Fisher and Davis as Chicago underworld characters. Walters, they said, was a brewer and leader in Chicago beer "rackets."

Arrest Confirmed
Blaney Matthews, district attorney's chief investigator, confirmed the announcement. He said Foster had been held in an outlying jail during the night and brought into headquarters this morning.

"A number of gangsters," Matthews added, "also are in custody." He said they are believed to be members of Foster's "gang."

Two Chicago officers have been working under cover here for two weeks, Matthews said, and this was why the authorities were wary about giving out information.

"It was a big mob," said Matthews. "We didn't get them all, but every police department in the United States today is looking for the men who slipped away from us."

Other Gangsters Flee
Matthews said others of the gang apparently fled the city in a hurry when news of the hunt here leaked out.

"We have got Foster," Captain Taylor said, "and four others we have reason to believe have been implicated in major crimes in Chicago."

He intimated the possession of other information concerning Foster, saying "at this time I cannot reveal how much Foster is involved in the Lingo killing."

A young woman, who registered at an apartment house as Mrs. Frank Bowman of Chicago, continued in technical custody. She was arrested last night, but her identity remained a mystery. Police at first tentatively identified her as Foster's wife.

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and getting the concrete in shape for construction, will start. The building is to be 57,105 feet, composed of three stories and will house the post office, which will occupy all of the first floor, and all other federal offices, including the reclamation service.

New Design
The exterior is to be of an attractive design in stone facing and brick terra cotta, with tiled roof. The architecture will not be of the standard type that was carried out in all government buildings several years ago, Mr. Williams explained, but will be of an original design since the recent extensive government building program calls for buildings which will not all be similar.

The building will face Oak street, with a side entrance on Seventh. The interior will be most modern in every respect and the newest post office equipment will be installed for use as soon as possible. A marble finished lobby will greet the customers of the post office. The first floor will house, in addition to the attractive lobby room, a work room, postal offices and other offices necessary to post office work. The rest of the building will be divided into offices to take care of the different federal divisions.

Local Help Used
"All local men and local material, as far as possible, will be employed and used in the construction," Mr. Williams stated further.

Mr. Williams spent this morning inspecting the site, which he states is exceedingly favorable for a federal building since it is close to the main business section of town and on the level. He remarked that it was better than the average.

No European monarch since King Henry VIII, who married six wives in rapid succession, has had a more romantic career than young King Carol II who sits on the throne of Rumania today, the new ruling head of an incredible royal family.

Three women have played big roles in the colorful life of this new monarch who now rules Rumania's 17,000,000 subjects.

The first was his boyhood sweetheart, the pretty daughter of a commoner and said to be the only woman he ever really loved. His stern father, King Ferdinand, annulled their morganatic marriage and sent him on a trip around the world to forget.

The second was a princess of royal blood, Helen of Greece, to whom he was forced into a royal marriage for reasons of state, though neither ever really

loved the other.

The third was a red-haired divorcee, Mme. Lupescu, reputed to be the daughter of a Rumanian junk dealer, for whose career Crown Prince Carol deserted his wife and child and fled with her to Paris that she might become his mistress.

Now this gay royal playboy has returned to Rumania to wrest from his nine-year-old son, the "Boy King" Michael, the crown that he once renounced for the love of his titian-haired charmer.

DRY AGENT IN REPEAL CAUSE

"Possibly officials in Washington think he can be more easily swayed than myself. I do not know, but I now publicly admonish him to gather together all his strength to withstand the onslaught, for I am sure he will have need for all the ability and courage he can command."

"And now, after four years as one of the highest field officials in prohibition enforcement, with three years of that time as administrator in New York, I publicly declare that certain treasury officials who have been charged with enforcement of the national prohibition act, and who are still to remain in charge of kindred activities, have not been sincere in their efforts to enforce this law."

Transfer Means Nothing
"Further, in New York and other areas in which the sentiment of the people is predominantly wet, this transfer of enforcement activities to the department of justice will mean nothing so long as prohibition precautions are left to United States attorneys who possess political aspirations, the success of which must depend upon their ability to win the approval of local politicians and their community for their prosecuting activities."

"Finally, after my years of service in the prohibition bureau, after watching closely the results of prohibition from the inside, and after the most thoughtful and serious consideration of the matter, I have reached the following conclusion:

Prohibition Illogical
"Prohibition is not the logical solution for temperance in our form of government, and I now publicly advocate the repeal of the eighteenth amendment before the nation is consumed in the fires of its consequences."

After issuing his statement Campbell learned a federal grand jury had handed up a presentment charging laxity in the issuance of permits in the office of the prohibition administrator and accusing him of nonfeasance.

Campbell said that the presentment had been indicted by United States Attorney Charles H. Tuttle.

Tuttle Plays Politics
"Mr. Tuttle is playing politics," he said. "Above all things, Mr. Tuttle desires to be the candidate for governor of this state."

Tuttle replied by denying that his office had anything to do with the grand jury presentment, and said that Campbell was mistaken regarding his candidacy for governor.

Campbell, who is 50 years old, has had a varied career. He was born in Philadelphia and was graduated from the New York university as a veterinary surgeon. After practicing his profession a short time he became a newspaper reporter.

Was Correspondent
During the Spanish-American war he was a war correspondent. Later he became a theatrical press agent and then a producer. During the war he saw active service in France and became a major.

After the war he was a motion picture director and producer until 1925, when he entered the prohibition enforcement service. He succeeded Chester P. Mills as prohibition administrator in New York in 1927.
