Eastern Ontario Swept by Storm

OTTAWA, July 1, (AP)—Two persons were killed, another died of a heart attack, and much damage was done by a wind and electrical storm which swept eastern Ontario and Quebec and night and today.

Arthur Morris was killed at Montreal when a high tension electrical wire was blown on him. John Lethell, watchman of the Ontario hospital at Brockville, was killed when he attempted to pick up a fallen electric light wire. Mrs. Mary Ann Harrington, of Ottawa, frightened by a flash of lightning, collapsed and died.

The storm swept around Ottawa but at Montreal it blew over chimneys, flooded cellars and disrupted public utility lines.

Drag Lewis River For Body of Youth

KELSO, Wash., July 1, (AP)—Authorities today dragged the Lewis river for the body of Albert Williams, 11, Bremerton, Wash., one of the two youths drowned in the river yesterday while swimming. The other was Carl Deemer, 11.

Ray Welch, 9, swimming with them, saw Deemer and Williams wade out to beyond their depths. They failed to reappear, and Welch ran for help. Fred McSaham, the first to reach the river, recovered Deemer's body.

POLICE ARREST FOSTER'S WIFE

Killer of Jake Lingle Thought to Be in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, July 1, (AP)—Accompanied by two Chicago detectives, police here arrested a woman tentatively identified today as Mrs. Frank Foster, whose husband is sought in connection with the slaying of Alfred (Jake) Lingle, Chicago newspaper reporter.

At the time of her arrest in an apartment in an exclusive residential district, the woman gave the name of Mrs. Frank Bowman.

Rumored Foster in Jail
Detectives revealed they are searching for Foster and expect to have him in custody in a short time. A rumor was current Foster had been arrested and is being held in an outlying jail, but officers refused to verify it.

The arrest of the woman occurred shortly after detectives from Chicago appeared at the district attorney's office and asked aid.

Registered as Bowman
The register of the apartment house where the woman was taken into custody contained the names of Mrs. and Mrs. Frank Bowman, Chicago. Police said they learned she had told tenants in the building she and her husband were married in Chicago last February and came here for the summer.

Lingle was shot to death June 9 in a crowd subway at Michigan Boulevard and Randolph streets, Chicago. Police there say the gun used in the slaying, thrown away by the killer as he ran from the scene, was owned by Foster.

Summer Student Walks in Front Of Car; Is Killed

SALEM, July 1, (AP)—Mrs. Ada Grimes of Prineville, 47, died in a physician's office at Monmouth late yesterday, a few minutes after she had been struck by an automobile driven by Wayne Klein, 26, of Corvallis.

Miss Edna Grimes, who shouted a warning to her daughter, said she did not consider Klein to blame. The accident happened at street intersection. Klein was said to have applied the brakes and skidded his wheels about eight feet when he saw the woman ahead of him. Mrs. Grimes was believed to have become confused.

Mrs. Grimes, her summer school students at the state normal school at Monmouth, the Sherman county, during the school year just closed.

Mrs. L. Schaefer Sent to Hospital

PORTLAND, July 1, (AP)—Mrs. Lena L. Schaefer, one of the two women who claimed motherhood to a five-months-old infant awarded to Miss Geraldine Watson, Los Angeles and Phoenix, was taken to the state hospital at Salem today after commitment by Judge Tarwell.

George L. Schaefer, the woman's husband, signed an insanity complaint against her. He told the court she threw a coffee pot at him, attempted suicide by inhaling gas, and tossed an armful of groceries out of the home.

Deputy sheriffs who, accompanied by a police matron, took Mrs. Schaefer to the sanity hearing were forced to break down a door to Mrs. Schaefer's bedroom to remove her.

USE CABLE SYSTEM

SALEM, Ore., July 1, (AP)—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company today cut in the first of the new underground cable circuits on the Portland-Salem system. Several aerial circuits are eliminated.

Spiders' webs, which are used in aerial photography and surveying, are being "cultivated" in Canada.

Poorer Classes In China Suffer In Intense Heat

SHANGHAI, July 1, (AP)—The Yangtze Valley today was in the grip of a heat wave which has caused intense suffering among the poorer classes.

For three days the temperature has ranged from 95 to 100. During the nighttime Shanghai's streets were thronged with the poor, some of them lying on sidewalks and gutters to escape the heat of their homes.

Gather in Streets
Within the native sections of the city thousands of half-naked persons seeking relief from the heat gathered in the streets at night. This resulted in an order by Chinese authorities reading as follows:

"Half-naked persons appearing in the streets hereafter will be fined \$2, as the act constitutes an offense against public morals. Upon payment of the fine the culprit will be given a shirt.

"Persons sleeping in streets and upon sidewalks, thereby impeding traffic, also will be fined."

Forest Service to Improve Stations

PORTLAND, July 1, (AP)—Major John Guthrie, assistant regional forester, said today \$200,000 will be spent in improving the forest equipment and protection facilities of the 22 national forests of the Pacific northwest region.

Mount Hood national forest leads with an allotment of \$16,000 made by J. C. Buck, regional forester.

The money will be used to improve lookout stations and build 47 additional stations.

Pedestrian Stops Portland Robber

PORTLAND, July 1, (AP)—William Reuther, 40, was in jail today charged with robbing a hotel pharmacy of \$50 and terrorizing a score of pedestrians with gunfire.

Reuther was caught in a thrilling downtown chase by F. W. Duffield, Portland, who leaped on a running taxicab and grappled with Reuther who had commandeered the cab.

Police assisted Duffield in subduing Reuther.

Four More Bodies Recovered From Passenger Wreck

SUDBURY, Ont., July 1, (AP)—The bodies of a man and three children were taken today from the flooded coaches of a derailed passenger train, bringing to 15 the number of victims of two railroad accidents near Sudbury last Thursday. Both wrecks were caused by washouts in a severe storm which swept the district.

The children had been reported missing, but the finding of the man's body occasioned surprise, as it was thought all the passengers had been accounted for. The body was identified as that of Ben Giles of Lloydminster, Sask.

Four children were killed or drowned in the wreck of the passenger train, which, with Giles, made five victims, and 10 persons were killed in a wreck of a freight train, among them the engineer and fireman.

SALEM, Ore., July 1, (AP)—J. H. Rockhill, city marshal at Jefferson, was before Justice of the Peace Small here yesterday charged with driving a car without license plates or windshield sticker. He told the court he had recently acquired the car and that he had applied for a new license.
