Communists and Police Slain in Mexican Uprising

TORREON, Mexico, July 1. (AP)—The correspondent of La Prensa reports that twenty Communists and police were killed and eight persons wounded in a severe encounter in the streets of Matamoros, Coahuila, near here.

The dispatch stated that the Communists had sought permission to parade in protest against the government's arrests of Communists in various parts of Mexico.

Three times refused, they decided to march anyway. The police blocked their path. Members of the demonstrators opening fire on the officers.

Arturo Pena, chief of police, the report said, was wounded. He had given orders for a general attack.

Troops were hurried to the scene. The dispatch said they soon restored order.

Oregon Leads in Horse Slaughter

SALEM, Ore., July 1. (AP)—Out of 122,518 horses that were slaughtered in the United States for eating purposes during the 11 months ending with May, 1929, Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, estimates that nearly half were killed in Oregon.

He said that in Portland horses are killed for meat at the rate of from 100 to 200 daily. The killing is done under federal inspection, and much of the meat is shipped to other states or exported to other countries.

The total horse slaughter in the United States for the preceding year was 104,907, showing a gain of 15 per cent last year. During the same time the slaughter of cattle and hogs in federally inspected plants decreased and sheep increased.

Kozer Advocates Building Program Of Several Years

SALEM, Ore., July 1. (AP)—A state building program to cover a period of some years in the future is advocated by Sam A. Kozer, state budget director, in a statement made public Sunday. He declares that such a program is necessary if the constantly growing number of state wards are to be cared for adequately in the penitentiary, the insane hospitals, feeble-minded home and other state institutions.

Institutions Crowded

Since the insane hospital at Salem is filled to capacity and the Pendleton institution is approaching that point he thinks it may be necessary before many years to build a third state hospital for the insane.

Since the state has a financial deficit of over \$2,000,000 Kozer suggested that such a program should be financed by a bond issue, a special tax levy or by some other method to be devised.

He points out that while the new intangibles and excise tax acts are large revenue producers they do not increase the state's income for the reason that they reduce the property tax in proportion to the amount they bring in.

Portland Shows Gain of 61,737 in Ten-Year Period

PORTLAND, July 1. (AP)—Revised census figures, as announced by Mrs. G. T. Gestinger, census supervisor, indicated Portland's population is 201,311 or 61,737 more than the 1920 figure, a gain of about 62 per cent.

Portland's metropolitan area contains 457,316 persons. The number of unemployed persons in Multnomah county, according to figures, was 14,149 on April 2, or slightly less than 4.2 per cent of the county's population.
