MAIN EVENTERS READY FOR ANY KIND OF BREAK

Langford Reduces Belt Line and Is Socking Like a Heavy; Trulmans Prepares to Show Fans Some Real Class; Balance of Card One of Best Lined Up by "Tex" in His Whole Career.

Having in mind the visitors to the "Big Show" as well as always looking after the demands of the regular cash customers, Joe Rickertstaff has lined up one of the very best fight cards of his career in Klamath Falls as a matchmaker. He knows from experience that this high school boy is a real fighter and the colored gent wants to meet some more of the big timers before that enemy of his, Sammy, is not old by any means but there is a limit to the time when a fighter can stay in the limelight and he wants another break with Young Corbett and some of the boys of that class which give a pug a rating.

That belt line of Sam's has practically disappeared and his wind is greatly improved, so much so in fact, that the fans are making him the favorite 10-5 in the betting.

Boston Red Sox, Lacking in Hitting Power, Lead Rest of American League in Pitching

Regardless of their humble position in the American league standing as the baseball season nears its halfway mark, the Boston Red Sox can put in a claim for the honor of having the best pitching in the major leagues. They can't hit well enough to take advantage of their hurling.

Of the group of moundmen, Milt Gaston is perhaps the hardest worker and most effective pitcher. The star right-hander pitched again yesterday and held the Cleveland Indians to three hits in his sixth complete game in succession, and his 14th of the season. He also made just as many hits as he allowed, having a perfect day at bat. The Red Sox collected 11 hits off Moll Harder, but the best score they could produce was 3 to 1. It was Cleveland's 16th defeat in 19 games.

Main Stops Game

Bob Grove, Philadelphia's speed ball ace, did about as well as Gaston in the brief time the weather allowed the Athletics to play. He allowed Detroit just one hit in five innings, while Young Dibs Williams aided him to a 4 to 1 victory. Williams produced most of Philadelphia's counters by driving out a home run when he was

sent in as a pinch batsman with two on base in the second inning.

The National league was saved a lot of complications when the Brooklyn Robins blew off the accumulated bad baseball of weeks in one inning against the St. Louis Cardinals. Watson Clark, Brooklyn's leading southpaw, proved ineffective in the second frame and Clete Dudley and Jim Elliott were not much better. They gave nine hits, and behind the Robins fielders committed three errors. The result was eleven runs and a 15 to 7 victory for St. Louis.

Giants Down Cubs

While this was going on, the league-leading Chicago Cubs were in the process of losing a 7 to 0 decision to the New York Giants. The Cubs are a game and a half ahead now, but the Robins, had they won, would have found themselves in the strange position of being ahead in the percentage table and behind in games.

Fred Fitzsimmons was the leader in the victory over the league leaders that kept the Giants in third place.

Kiki Cuyler's two home runs and Hack Wilson's one were all that produced victory for the Cubs. Pittsburgh replaced Boston in Fourth place by defeating the Braves 8 to 2.
