

JURY CONVICTS SANHUBER ON SLAYING COUNT

Attic Lover to Serve
Term for Killing
F. Oesterreich

LOS ANGELES, July 2, (AP)—Otto Sanhuber, who for the love of Mrs. Walburga Oesterreich, lived in garrets for eleven years, and climaxed his bat-like existence by shooting to death Fred Oesterreich, wealthy Milwaukee manufacturer and husband of his sweetheart, lies huddled in his cell in the county jail today, convicted of manslaughter.

As the verdict which will send him to prison for one to ten years was read shortly after 9 o'clock last night, the meek little man slumped back in his chair, but spoke no word.

Dejected, he was led to his cell to await formal pronouncement of the sentence tomorrow.

Prosecutor Asked Death
The prosecution asked that death be the penalty for the crime, but the request was not granted by the six women and six men sitting in judgment. Mrs. Rita Harlan, forewoman, said in the seven ballots taken not one juror voted for a first degree verdict. The jury deliberated approximately nine hours.

Earl Wakeman, defense attorney, said he will seek to have the verdict set aside on the ground the statute of limitations has expired on manslaughter.

To Have Sanity Hearing
Sanhuber's second plea, not guilty because of insanity, yet is to be disposed of. Superior Judge Carlos Hardy, who conducted the trial, did not set a time for the sanity hearing.

The widow, jointly accused with Sanhuber, won a separate trial, which will open in a week.

The Oesterreich slaying appeared in police records for more than seven years as unsolved.

Recently Herman Shapiro, once Mrs. Oesterreich's attorney, presented an affidavit to authorities in which he said Sanhuber had confessed his attic life to him, and admitted he slew Oesterreich. Sanhuber confessed the crime to the grand jury, but during his trial repudiated his story, saying Shapiro coached him in it and told him it would save Mrs. Oesterreich.

Risko Hoping to Spoil Griffith's Heavy Ambitions

CHICAGO, July 2, (AP)—Rubbishy Johnny Risko, despoiler of ring ambitions and hopes, packs his rugged fighting fists in leather tonight in a determined attempt to wreck the comeback plans of Gerald Ambrose Griffith, the tough heavyweight from Sioux City, Iowa.

The two meet in the main 10 round event at the Chicago Stadium's boxing card. Fifteen thousand fight fans, assured of a rematch at bargain prices in case of a foul, are expected to watch the duel.

For Griffith, the fight was regarded as a crisis in his rather erratic career.

Foul Blows Under Ban in New York

NEW YORK, July 2, (AP)—In the future, there will be no foul punches in a New York ring. The New York state athletic commission has legislated them out of existence.

Under a new regulation adopted by the commission, boxers will devise their own implements of protection, subject to approval by the commission, and then waive all right to claim a foul whenever a blow may land.

All referees in this state will be informed that all fighters claiming a foul in the future shall be counted out.

The drastic ruling was suggested by Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion, and Al Singer, of New York, who meet in a titular battle here July 17. Both asked for a ruling, which would prevent that bout from ending in a foul.
