MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 3. (A. P.)—Produce exchange maintained cube butter grades at unchanged wholesale prices today except for firsts which were cut a cent to 28 cents a pound. Demand was strong on top grades, especially for 80-92 score, but medium and under grades were drab. Some dealers were holding closely for higher prices.

New strength in the egg market was evident in 1 cent advances on all grades by a few dealers through the Pacific Co-operative Association announced quotations unchanged. Receipts so far this week have run 600 cases under last week. Receipts continue fair.

U. S. department of agriculture, bureau of markets, reviewed the fruit and vegetable trade as follows:

Watermelon shipments from California are decreasing, with only 60 cars yesterday. Although there are about 25 cars of watermelons on track at Portland, jobbers are holding their prices steady at 2 1/2-2 3/4c per lb., in anticipation of active week-end demand.

Yellow transparent apples from The Dalles are now being received on the wholesale market, moving at about 75c per 15-pound box.

Local white potatoes are jobbing as low as 2-2 1/4c per pound. Kennewick cobbler's rule 1c higher.

Red raspberries are now in moderate supply at \$2.50 per crate.

CALVES: Receipts 40. Steady to strong.

SHEEP: Receipts 175, on contract. Steady.

BUTTER: Firsts, cent lower; other grades steady. Firsts 28c.
