A Timely Reminder

THE summer season is here. Grass and leaves are beginning to turn and the ever present danger of fire is more apparent. The Forest Service is doing everything within its power to prevent fires, or at least to keep them as low as possible. One of the latest reminders to the public is captioned "Good Manners in the Forests" and contains the following advice:

You may be reasonably "wild and woolly" when you go camping in the national forests of Oregon and Washington, but don't leave your good manners at home. Take them with you. You need them more on your vacation than when you are at home. The rules for good manners as given by the U. S. Forest Service are easy to learn and are followed by all good sportsmen, good campers and good tourists. They are:

First obtain a camp fire permit.
Carry a shovel and ax.
Smoke only in camp.
Drown your fire dead out with water.
Leave a clean and sanitary camp.
Observe the state fish and game laws.
Co-operate with the forest rangers and state fire warden in reporting and suppressing forest fires.
Practice these rules and preach them, too.

Attention is also called to the fact that forest fires directly affect the tourist travel in Oregon and Washington. The prevalence of large fires in the Pacific Northwest with their accompanying smoke clouds hiding the scenery and tainting the atmosphere unquestionably keeps many people away and causes others already in the region to leave hurriedly. If there were no other reason why caution should be exercised in the forests, this one thing alone is of enough vital interest to the Northwest to cause people to observe the regulations of the Forest Service uncompromisingly.

ACCIDENT PREVENTION
Indianapolis News: Because of accidents, it has been found by a survey conducted by insurance investigators, adults in the United States lose annually 1,500,000 years from their regular pursuits. The total is calculated from the average life expectancy of those killed, to which is added the time required for recovery of those not hurt fatally. The vast importance of safety campaigns, while widely realized, is thus made more impressive. There is no accurate method of judging the extent of the damage in the way of social disruption, but clearly it is tremendous. Only approximate figures are available concerning a part of the economic cost.

Mortality and disabilities as a consequence of motor vehicle accidents are estimated to cause at least \$2,000,000,000 a year in loss of income, either paid out or not received. Occupational mishaps, that is those happening in connection with work, account for \$1,000,000,000. Other classifications, including accidents at home and to pedestrians, increase the total greatly. In addition, the expense of hospitalization and doctors' bills must be considered. They add enormously to the aggregate. The lesson to be drawn is unmistakable. Care in avoiding mishaps not only helps to prevent tragedy and sorrow, but pays dividends in dollars and cents.

This economic aspect alone is of immense import in national affairs, although, of course, secondary to the human element. From whatever standpoint the situation is analyzed, the need for steady and growing activity in safety measures in all communities stands forth.

It's Too Hot in Washington
Excited About Nothing, but the People's Legislative Service, a La Follette Heirloom, is Hard at It.

WASHINGTON, July 3.—Days in Washington have begun and although no one who remains here can keep from being hot, almost no one is willing to get all hot and bothered about anything. The news out of Washington seems rather insipid. No one with a federal job dares say anything interesting because this is an election year. And it's too hot for politicians to fight, let alone do any work.

Into this atmosphere of sweltering quiescence suddenly bursts the People's Legislative Service, flaming with wrath, effervescing with steam and seething with deadly intent to tear the hide off people. This organization does that sort of thing with more gusto, if not with more artistic effect, than anyone else around here. And in all kinds of weather. It is a heritage of the elder Senator La Follette, bequeathed to—or afflicted upon, as the case may be—the capital after his death.

And here's a sample
"G. O. P. Hurrahs for Bare Bleeding Feet," says Mercer J. Johnston, the Service director, in a nice, restrained way in his latest bulletin.

"Loud cheers and yells," it quotes from a newspaper account, "greeted Speaker Longworth's announcement of the vote that the Garner resolution to put shoes back on the free list had been defeated."

"It was not in Bedlam," says Mr. Johnston, "but in our tariffed House of Representatives, that this ecstatic explosion occurred. The time was not B. C. but June 5, A. D. 1930."

The vote to keep shoes on the feet of the poor this coming winter was 119, including 30 decent Republicans. The vote to take shoes off the feet of the poor this winter was 181; including seven Democrats with hopeful smiles and actual rings in their noses.

"It means that bare and bleeding feet will be seen this winter on city streets and country roads in far greater numbers than was ever witnessed at Valley Forge at the apex of the agony of the struggle against overseas oppression."

"Now that the dishes of the Presidential Barmecide Feast for the army of the unemployed are being swept unceremoniously from the boards, and cheap political prosperity chatter even makes the proverbial dog sick, only those who will not see can be blind to the oncoming spectacle. . . . Those loud cheers and yells for bare and bleeding feet are destined to become the moving refrain of a political funeral march dedicated to the party in power."

The fact is that if these bulletins were getting wider circulation the country would be getting a lot more entertainment than it is now.

Carl Jackson Takes Prohibition Office

SEATTLE, July 3. (AP)—Taking office here today as prohibition administrator for Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Alaska, Carl Jackson, discarded coats and vests and announced his policy would be "to halt liquor at its source rather than seek out hip-pocket toters."

"I shall devote my attention to ferreting out causes involving liquor manufacturing, transportation, conspiracy and abatement," he said.

Coming here from Fort Worth where he was administrator in Texas under the treasury department prohibition enforcement organization, he takes charge of a Pacific northwest province enlarged under the new department of justice organization to include Montana and Idaho.

GREEN SUCCEEDS PIPES

SALEM, Ore., July 3. (AP)—B. A. Green, who has practiced law in Portland for 15 years, was yesterday appointed by the supreme court as a member of the state board of bar examiners. He succeeds George A. Pipes of Portland, who resigned. The other members of the board are Roscoe C. Nelson, Roy Shields and Hall S. Lusk, all of Portland, and John H. Carson of Salem.

EIGHTEEN YEARS AGO IN KLAMATH

On motion of Attorney J. C. Rutledge for the plaintiffs, the suit of the Long Lake Lumber company vs. the City of Klamath Falls and the Sheriff of Klamath county, was dismissed in circuit court this morning.

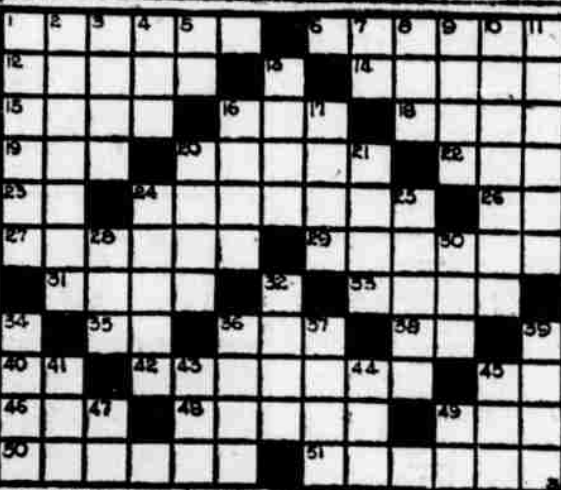
closing of all of the banks and business houses of the city, the former all the afternoon, while the stores will be closed from 2 until 5 o'clock.

New Bill Modifies Jones Liquor Law

WASHINGTON, July 3. (AP)—The senate today passed a house bill modifying the Jones law to provide lighter penalties to petty offenders of the prohibition act.

The measure went through the senate on motion of Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, without debate. It provides those convicted of selling, making or transporting less than a gallon of liquor are subject to a penalty of not more than \$2500 and jail sentence of not more than six months.

The senate amended the bill to stipulate those lighter terms should apply only if the defendant was not engaged habitually

SALEM, Ore., July 3. (AP)—There will be no letting down in police action against Oregon motor vehicle owners who have not purchased new license plates. Secretary of State Hose said today. He said that the report had gone out that the department was going to slack up for a time, following the first day after new licenses were due, and that violators would be treated leniently. Future Farmers
Are Inspiration
Help Oregon
Make Profits

SALEM, Ore., July 3. (UP)—One of the most progressive, constructive boy organizations in Oregon is the Future Farmers of America, says Earl R. Cooley, state supervisor of vocational agricultural education.

PLANS OF THIS group for 1931 include attempted accomplishments of even greater importance than have heretofore been included.

Gives Inspiration
"THE TRAINING and inspiration given the young Future Farmers is probably one of the outstanding educational features in Oregon today," Cooley said. "It not only teaches boys to complete agricultural projects with an object of achieving the utmost profit, but it inspires them to either save that ultimate profit from the venture or apply it to more ambitious enterprises."

TODAY in the United States, there are 90,000 boys of high school age who are members of the Future Farmers, Cooley said. Seven hundred and forty-five are in Oregon, carrying on the work of the club, holding annual meetings, selecting officers and generally displaying their accomplishments along agricultural lines.

SOME OF THE outstanding purposes for 1931 include establishment by members of 90 per cent thrift accounts, completion of 90 per cent of the supervised project enterprises and payment of 100 per cent due to both the local chapter and the national organization.

DURING THE past year, 29 Oregon chapters of the F. F. A. were represented with exhibits at the Pacific International Live stock show at Portland. One of these teams won a judging contest in competition with 60 school teams from northwestern states. Eighteen chapters were represented at county fairs during the year.

Make Profits

THE MOST important accomplishments for 1929, which it is hoped will be measurably extended during the year, was the heavy gain in financial returns from supervised projects. For the year, it totaled \$71,954.35. Each member of the organization in Oregon thus earned an average income of \$114.35, Cooley stated. EXAMPLES of projects included during the year were: Raising of 50 head of sheep and 570 chicks with a net profit of \$1,167.95. Another boy grew 1 1/2 acres of asparagus, realizing a net profit of \$1,168.90, it was shown.

Defective Signal Causes Bad Wreck

SASSO, Italy, July 2. (AP)—Fifteen persons were killed today and 39 injured in a collision of a train from Milan with a freight train eleven miles from Bologna.

The accident was ascribed to a defect in the electrical signaling apparatus. The collision occurred in Sasso station, where the freight train had halted. The locomotive and several coaches of the passenger train were derailed.

Engine Numerals Give Practice to Puzzle Solvers

Emerging triumphant from a long struggle with crossword puzzles, college questionnaires and intelligence tests, the advanced class of puzzle-solvers has just scored another victory. This became known today with announcement that the mystery of the enigmatic combination of letters and numerals painted on the sides of Southern Pacific locomotive cabs has been cleared up at last. Take for example:

A-11 35 B-44 S. F.
Of course, any one could figure it out. But to save time, here's the answer:

Here's the Answer
The prefix "A" indicates that the locomotive is of the company's so-called Atlantic or 4-4-2 type.

The figure 35 shows the diameter of the drivers in inches. The fraction 35 over 28 indicates that the cylinders are 23 inches in diameter and the stroke is 28 inches.

The next fraction, 137 over B-64, indicates that there are 137,000 pounds on the driving wheels, and the B-64 tells that the engine has a "booster" and that there are 64,000 pounds on the trailing truck wheels to which the booster is geared.

The suffix letters, S. F., indicate that the locomotive has a superheater and feed water heater—"S" designating the former and "F" the latter.

And that's all there is to it!

House Votes Sum For Enforcement

WASHINGTON, July 3. (AP)—The house voted \$250,000 to the Hoover law enforcement commission today for continuation of its general study through another year.

Before that sum is assured, however, differences with the senate must be reconciled. The senate voted only \$50,000, and limited the commission to an inquiry into prohibition enforcement.

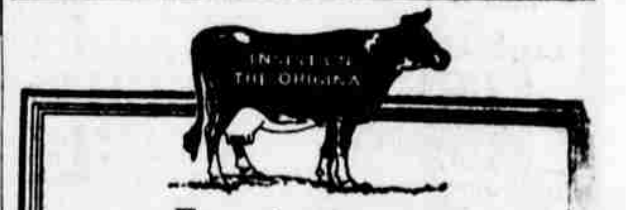
The house first voted authorization for continuation of the study with the larger fund. Then the amount was inserted in the second deficiency bill to replace the provision.
