Games were played and later dainty refreshments were served by Mrs. Winetrou. The party lasted from 2 until 4.

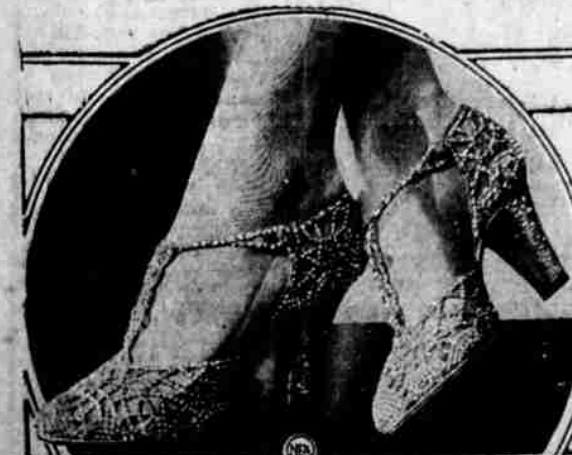
