Doris Jones, first ranking woman player, of Klamath Falls, was eliminated by Helen Edmiston of Medford before she reached the semi-finals.

Miss Coss Champion

Vivian Coss, Medford's star woman player and University of Oregon champ, became champion of southern Oregon after eliminating Helen Edmiston with a score of 6-9, 5-0.

Jimmie Edmiston won the championship cup by defeating Doug Ballentine the best three out of five sets, 7-5, 7-5, 5-4.

Bailey and Edmiston of Medford became the men's doubles champions by eliminating Robertson and Richmond of Klamath Falls with a score of 6-2, 5-3.

In the mixed doubles, Doris Jones and Miss Gertson led in the finals to Bailey and Miss Helen Edmiston with a score of 6-1, 6-4.
