Variety of Causes Lead
To Deaths in Widely
Separated Areas

said he had apparently exhausted his strength and collapsed.

Blowing an air route from Chicago to Mackinac Island, Mich., for the Continental Airways, Inc., Bert E. Kogler, 25, and Duane L. Heller, 26, both of Chicago, were drowned in Lake Michigan when their cabin airplane plunged into the water south of South Haven, Mich.

Witnesses said the plane had veered out over the lake to avoid shoreline bluffs hidden by fog, and was flying low. Coast guardsmen recovered the body of Kogler.

Stunt Plane Falls
Dick Dodds of Santa Ana, Calif., manager of the aviation department of the Union Oil company, was stunting above the Sunday crowds at Laguna Beach, Calif., when his plane lost altitude in a steep climb, failed to right itself, and dived into Crescent bay.

Fishing boats and pleasure craft dragged the twisted wreckage to shore. Dodds' body was in the cockpit.

Martin Wilks, 19, a student pilot, and John W. Gorman, 40, his instructor, were killed at the Floyd Bennett field on Barren Island, New York.

BOX FACTORY OPENS TODAY

In connection with the erection of the plant. Previous to working with the Wertheim company, Mr. Strong was in Baker, Ore., where he was superintendent of the Oregon Lumber company. He is well known in Klamath Falls, having visited here on many occasions.

Assisting him as superintendent, Mr. J. A. Fletcher will have charge of the floor work and output. Both have offices in the new building. Mr. Fletcher comes here from Spokane, where he held a similar position with the same company.

Can Double Output
The box factory is 25x125 feet, and has been completed in time for the opening. The entire space is not utilized, and it is possible to more than double the capacity of the factory.

The total output, when running to capacity of the present machines, will be 100,000 feet of box stock per day. Orders are already filed, and many more are being received. One hundred men will be employed by the first of next week, according to Mr. Strong.

Sir Arthur, played many roles in his life, and most of them famously. He was a physician in the 80's, and a sensational brilliant novelist in the 90's.

After the dawn of this century Sir Arthur exerted his literary efforts in placing before Europe the facts of the Boer war, and for this he was made a knight of the realm.

Delved Into Spiritualism
In the world war, when his son lost his life, Sir Arthur delved deeply into spiritualism, through that medium seeking to detect the world beyond, with all the zeal he had put into his previous fictional writings.

When he was 60 Sir Arthur announced his retirement from writing, to devote the remainder of his days to the study and expounding of spiritualism. He thereafter wrote books about the occult, crossing oceans to lecture, and was the world's superb assurance of his faith by announcing he and Lady Doyle were fully convinced they had communicated with their dead son, and that the son had replied. The father's ears had heard his voice.

For all his fame as a writer, Sir Arthur was unsuccessful as a politician. He twice ran for parliament, but each time was defeated.

Billings Bid Denied
The California supreme court last week denied the application for a pardon from Warren Billings, convicted companion of Mooney in the dynamiting. Billings is serving a life sentence in Folsom prison and his only hope of clemency can come from the court, inasmuch as it was a felon before the bombing.

Mooney, serving his first term, a life sentence also, can be pardoned by the governor.

The governor previously has said he would be guided in the Mooney case by the supreme court's action on Billings but has not committed himself since the court decision on the Billings application.

any time it would almost be in their power.

The opposition includes Senators Johnson, California; Hale, Maine; Moses, New Hampshire; Robinson, Indiana, and Oddie Nevada, all republicans, and McKellar democrat, Tennessee.

The galleries were filled. Sitting alone in the diplomatic gallery was Mrs. Henry L. Stimson, wife of the secretary of state. Stimson headed the American delegation to London.

Senator Reed, republican, Pennsylvania, a member of the delegation was on the floor but his colleague on the delegation, Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the democratic leader, was unable to be present for the opening roll call.

As soon as the president's message was read, Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee, called up the treaty and went through the formality of having it read. He then moved adjournment until tomorrow when Senator Swanson, democrat, Virginia will open the debate in behalf of the pact.

Before adjournment was taken, however, Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, an opponent of the pact, led the assault on the treaty by introducing a resolution to have the senate demand of President Hoover documents relating to the preliminary negotiations surrounding the pact. The president declined to give these to the senate foreign relations committee.

Senator Reed replied the whole row over the documents related only to cablegrams exchanged between Ambassador Dawes and the state department prior to the London parley. He said those cablegrams had been given to members of the delegation in confidence.
