

MOONEY LOSES PARDON QUEST

Case Parallel to That Of Billings, Gov. Young States

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John McDonald, or any other material witness, who has repudiated his former testimony, appear before them for the purpose of proving such repudiations as trustworthy, and that their former testimony was perjured. It may be only just and right to consider the propriety of giving hearing to such witnesses in the case of Billings, just as I should desire to do in the case of Mooney.

"Until the truth of the repudiating affidavits can be definitely established, no one can question the decision of the supreme court or the reasoning of the advisory pardon board. For there are certainly some portions of McDonald's affidavits which appear patently untrustworthy."

Didn't Identify Men
"For instance in his affidavit McDonald says that no positive identification of either Mooney or Billings was made by him; that Lieutenant Goff took him to the door of Mooney's cell and said: 'This is your man, this is Mooney' and that he subsequently took him to Billings cell and asked a turnkey to open the door and said: 'Come out here Billings.'"

"Upon careful investigation I am convinced that nothing of this kind occurred, nor can anyone believe that Billings and Mooney, and their attorneys, knew of such a spurious identification without calling attention to the matter in either of the trials."

Three Zones Laid Down
The decisions laid down three zones in the west and used them for outlining the differences found necessary.

For Zone 1, including all of the area east of the Missouri and of a line drawn from Sioux Falls via the Twin Cities to Duluth, a particular scale was laid down; for Zone 2, lying west of a line drawn from Superior, Wis., through Kearney, Neb., Aberdeen, S. D., and Blay, N. D., a slightly higher scale was fixed; while for Zone 3, including all points west of those described, the highest figure of rates was allotted.

Make Mileage Scales
On the mileage scales, first class rates in the first zone will begin at 35 cents per 100 pounds for shipments of five miles, rise to \$1.10 for districts 200 miles, and culminate at \$2.70 for distances of 1500.

In the second zone the charges begin at 24 cents for five miles, rise to \$1.41 for 400 miles, and are \$3.02 for 1500. In the westernmost, or third zone, the beginning charge of 36 cents permitted for five miles becomes \$1.53 for 400 miles and culminates with a charge of \$3.25 for 1500 miles.

Some Reductions
In eastern territory generally, the commission prescribed a distance basis for classified freight rates, which in some cases involved reductions from existing rate levels.

The eastern scale for first class shipments began by fixing a

charge of 30 cents per 100 pounds for distances of five miles; 51 cents for distances of 75; rising to 99 cents for 400 miles, and reaching \$1.45 for distances of 800 miles.

Proportionate charges are made for intermediate distances, while the 22 other classifications of freight are arranged proportionately to the schedule given for first class shipment.

Fix Differentials
In both class rate adjustments announced, the commission fixed a number of differentials applying to specific territory and laid down schedules of key rates governing movements between eastern and western territory.

In addition to the western adjustment, certain agricultural commodities were exempted from increase, while classifications ordinarily applying to farm supplies were changed to prevent increased transport charges from coming upon them.

MALIN WORKING FOR RAIL LINE

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made to secure the Great Northern's line through this district, unless common user with the Southern Pacific is granted them.

The cost of building such a line, 24 miles south from Klamath Falls to the state line and then on into California, would be \$500,000 in excess of what the common user would cost, it was pointed out. An independent line would benefit this district to such a great extent, however, that it has been approved by the board of directors.

The chamber of commerce went on record to join with any other organizations in approving an attempt to secure this line through Malin and Poe Valley and will ask the Great Northern to give the matter careful consideration.
