The astounding success of the Brooklyn Robins this year has all the baseball experts crossed up. Picked by the so-called wise guys to finish no higher than sixth place, they have crossed everybody and have showed everything in both offense and defense.

Two of the big factors in the success of the Dodgers are Babe Herman and Del Bissanette. Both are sluggers and hit for extra bases and are the type of hitters who break up games by clouting the ball out of the park with men on the bases.

"I would just as soon hit a single if I can hit a home run," Babe Ruth often remarks when he gets a double or triple. And his National League rival, Babe Herman, is the same temperament.

Herman has plenty of color and is a left-handed hitter of terrific power. Many think he will be the Bambino's successor. Both began as pitchers, played first base for a while and then went to the outfield.

Ruth's legs will not stand many more campaigns, while Herman is a comparative youngster. Last year he hit 42 doubles, 13 triples and 21 home runs.

Not a bad year's work for the National League Babe.

Rabbit Maranville Having One Of Best Seasons of His Career

One reason why the Boston Braves are still in the thick of the National league battle is to be found in 150-odd pounds of unadulterated shortstop bearing the imposing name of Walter James Vincent Maranville, otherwise known as "Rabbit." This little baseball ancient, who has spent 18 of his 37 summers playing Major league ball, is having one of the best seasons of his long career.

Hitting Above .300 When he was one of the main cogs of Boston's amazing team of 1914, his batting average was only .246 and his mark for his 18th major league years is .262, but this season he is hitting above the .300 mark and is fielding right along with the league's best. When the Braves stepped out yesterday to trounce the league leading Brooklyn Robins, 4 to 1, Maranville merely made two of Boston's nine hits, scored once, handled eight fielding chances without an assist and started three of Boston's four double plays. Wally Berger came through with his 24th circuit blow of the year, gaining a tie with Hack Wilson and Chuck Klein for the National league lead.

Giants Humbled Completing the National league's day, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia made it a bad day for the first division. The Phillies, with Phil Collins on the mound, humbled the New York Giants 5 to 1.

The Pirates kept the St. Louis Cardinals a game and one half back of the third place Giants by slugging out a 10 to 5 victory. Washington continued to lead the American league parade with its ninth straight victory. The Senators, already in first place by several percentage points, beat out the Boston Red Sox, 6 to 5, and finally gained a tie with the Athletics for the top where games are concerned. The world's champions lost a half game by dividing their double header with the New York Yankees. George Walberg proved his sore arm something of a myth against the Yankees in the first game, holding them to three hits for a 4 to 0 triumph. The second contest was something of a slugfest with George Pippas outlasting four Athletic hurlers for a 9 to 4 victory.

White Sox Rise Chicago's White Sox rose a notch in the American league standing, going from seventh place to sixth as Ted Lyons gave them a 3 to 2 victory over Detroit while the St. Louis Browns were taking a 12 to 6 beating at the hands of the Cleveland Indians. Lyons not only pitched effectively against Detroit but drove in two of the runs with a triple in the second inning.

Seals Will Keep Crosetti to End Of Present Year

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9. (AP)—Owners of the San Francisco Seals expect to sell Frank Crosetti, 19-year-old shortstop star, to the big leagues for a fancy figure, but they will not let him go during the season, thereby taking chances of weakening the team.

George A. Putnam, secretary, disclosed today he had received a telegram, June 26, from Billy Evans, president of the Cleveland Americans, asking: "What is your proposition on Crosetti for immediate delivery. Could probably give you choice of two shortstops, a second baseman and four pitchers in deal."

Putnam said he had advised Evans that the Seals would not alter their policy of not delivering a player during the season. Eight major league clubs have had scouts trail the young infielder, who is hitting at a .332 clip.
