REDS UNCOVER HIDDEN POWER AGAINST CUBS

Display First Division Talent in Keeping Champs Down

The Cincinnati Reds are struggling deep in the second division of the National league, but when the Chicago Cubs, champions last season and contenders for this year's title, come along the Reds step out and play some first division baseball.

The Reds knocked the Cubs clear out of first place in the last two days by winning four games in a row, taking the final game with a 4 to 1 victory.

The defeat dropped the Cubs two full games into second place, as Brooklyn took both games of a double header from the Boston Braves. With Dazzy Vance pitching superlative ball, striking out nine, while he allowed only three hits, the Braves took the first game 5 to 0. The Braves put up a better battle in the second, and it required a home with the bases full by Del Bissontette to give Brooklyn a 4-4 decision.

Cards Climbing

The steadily advancing St. Louis Cardinals picked up another game on the New York Giants, and now are only half a game back of third place as the result of their 7 to 6 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates, while New York dropped another to Philadelphia by a 5-4 count.

The American league celebrated the end of Washington's long winning streak, which came at the hands of the Boston Red Sox in the second game of a double header, but the Senators still gained a half game on Philadelphia, and lead by that margin.

Washington continued to use only one pitcher to a game, but Lloyd Brown gave the Red Sox 17 hits in the second contest, while Milt Gaston held the Senators to eight, and Boston won, 5 to 1. Washington took the first game 5 to 2, behind Sam Jones' pitching to make it ten straight.

A's in Slump

The Athletics, in second place, had a very bad day against the New York Yankees, and went down by a score of 12 to 6. The Yankees still remained 5 1/2 games out of second place after their recent slump.

Once more Babe Ruth provided one of the day's biggest pieces of news by drawing down a three-day suspension because of the previous afternoon's dispute with Umpire Brick Owens. The punishment did not hurt Ruth, as an injury was keeping the Babe out of action.

Cleveland and Detroit won their games. The fourth place Indians slammed out a 9 to 5 decision over the St. Louis Browns to win their first series in almost a month. They took three out of four games.

The Detroit Tigers strengthened their hold on the top of the second division with a 6 to 1 triumph over the Chicago White Sox.

Emperor of Golf to Get Test Of Career in National Open Championship at Interlachen

MINNEAPOLIS, July 10, (AP)—Best Bobby Jones! That was the cry at Old Interlachen today as America's golfing stars and a Britisher, too—faced a blazing sun and a veritable purgatory of traps and bunkers in their first major offensive for the cherished national open championship.

If the emperor of golf has cracked under the mental strain of his invasion of England, he has failed to reveal it during four days of practice on the championship course.

Drives Not Quite Standard

The Jones drives haven't been quite up to the Jones standard, but his iron and putting game looked just like they have for in the past eight seasons. It was the same Bobby Jones against virtually the same field he conquered at Winged Foot last year.

Threatening him among the 142 entries were the "Big Ten" of pro golf—Walter Hagen, Horton Smith, Johnny Farrell, Gene Sarazen, Tommy Armour, MacDonald Smith, Leo Diegel, Al Espinosa, Bill Mehlhorn and Denny Shute. A host of dangerous amateurs, including Great Britain's single entry, Cyril Tolley, and the present and former American national amateur champions—Jimmy Johnston and George Von Elm—also were granted outside chances.

Opponents Good in Practice

From a glance at the championship course and past performance, it appeared that Jones chief enemies were Hagen, Farrell, Armour and Horton Smith. They have shown good golf during practice rounds and Hagen, especially, seemed to be back to the sensational game that made him one of the world's greatest. The "Haig" has centered his efforts largely on the outward nine in practice and has turned in two dazzling 39's, four under par.

Interlachen, stretching over 6,672 yards, doesn't boast the tough reputation of many of the former National open scenes, but it does have pitfalls galore. The rough holes are a great menace for those who have a habit of slapping their drives along the fairway fringe. A ball landing one foot off the fairway is in a more dangerous lie than a ball sliced or hooked 20 feet off, as the rough thins out away from the fairway.

Greens of Best Texture

The greens are of a best texture and the golfers complain each has from three to four different slants or rolls. There are eight par four holes, however, that can be reached with a drive and a sound mashie niblick shot; there are four easy par three holes, four par five holes that promise to produce birdies, and two par four holes that require use of woods in the fairways. These last two holes are expected to make or break golf hopes. They are the first and fourteenth and there is trouble for any golfer.

Jones Versus Field In National Open

Jack Hutchison, who has won about every other title except this, says the player will win whose putts are dropping, and not rimming the cup on these particular days.

Father of Five Children Tarred And Feathered

ORANGE CITY, Iowa, July 10, (AP)—John De Jong, 41, widower and father of five children, today told Sioux City county officers he was captured by a band of men who tarred and feathered him and left him bled in the streets here. He said he could recognize 17 of his attackers.

Sioux City officers said they expected to make arrests today. They said they believed the attack was the result of rumors involving De Jong in a local scandal.

De Jong said he was captured at the fair grounds, driven into the country, forced to undress and tarred and feathered. He said his attackers released him in the street without returning any of his clothes.
