According to T. H. Lang of the

Klamath Indian reservation, who represented Klamath members of the Indian Sacred church at its convention last week at Olympia, Wash., the Indian bureau is not

treating the Indians fairly, says the Oregonian. "It is a disgrace the way we Klamath Indians are handled, and we hope that conditions will

change very soon so that Indians can become full-fledged citizens of the United States with the full rights and property turned over to them which really

belong to them," said Mr. Lang. The Olympia convention was attended by about 600 Washington members of the Indian Sacred church and lasted five

days, during which time their alleged maltreatment by the Indian bureau was the main subject of discussion.
