

FOREST FIRES DESTROY BARN

A grass fire which destroyed some outbuildings on the P. C. Carlson ranch southeast of the city and which burned the west side of the Hogback spread over to the eastern side of the hill into brush and brush out the fire-fighting crew of the Klamath Forest Protective association yesterday.

The fire was under control last night, and timber which was threatened was saved. The protective association sent out a crew of men with a caterpillar to fight the fire early in the day.

A sizable fire on the forest reserve on Mt. Pratt north of Peshurst was believed under control last night after forest service crews with aid from the Forest Protective association had been fighting it.

"The humidity is low, the forests are dry and there is great danger of a disastrous fire breaking out at any time," Jack Kimball, head of the Forest Protective association, stated last night.

Stage Drivers to Give Vacationists "Break" on Roads

SALEM, Ore., July 11, (AP)—Vacationists who drive automobiles are in a hurry. They have only a short time in which to make as much distance as possible. Often they are forgetful of traffic dangers. Therefore, Oregon stage drivers, by orders from headquarters, are going to make concessions to them that legally may not be required.

Secretary of State Hess recently learned from traffic officers that some stage drivers were violating the law relative to speeding, taking too much road, and stopping their vehicles too near the center of the highway. Hess wrote about it to R. W. Lemen, vice president of the Pacific Greyhound line in charge of operations in Oregon.

Lemen issued a bulletin to his drivers, reminding them that violators of the law would be dealt with severely.

He added: "Those 'other cars' are out working against time to squeeze in as much vacation as possible on a short vacation, and their drivers are not thinking of the dangers on the highway. Therefore, it remains for us to be on guard, and to give them even the best of the deal to avoid trouble."

Petitions Out For Meier's Nomination

Petitions were being signed in the city and county yesterday requesting the republican state committee when it meets in Portland on July 25 to nominate Julius L. Meier, of Portland, as the party's nominee for governor.

Names of farmers, laborers in factories, box factories, lumber mills and some main street workers were on the petitions last night.

Enthusiasm here is strong for Meier a survey shows. Meier was for 25 years one of the late George W. Joseph's closest friends and associates in the law practice and in business.

In the May primary election Joseph received 539 votes in Klamath county, running third. Governor A. W. Norblad who has stated he is not a candidate for the nomination now received 1088 and Harry L. Corbett was second with 614. Joseph's heavy vote was among the laboring classes and the farmers, the same classes signing the petitions favoring the nomination of Meier.

BRIDGE IS NAMED

It has been decided that the Southern Pacific's new \$12,000,000 bridge across Salsun bay will be named the Martinez-Benevia bridge, according to word received by C. M. Biggs, district agent for that company here.

This bridge, which will eliminate the ferrying of trains from Fort Costa to Benevia, and which will considerably shorten running time of both passenger and freight trains between Klamath Falls and San Francisco Bay points, will be dedicated on Thanksgiving Day.

"SLIM" CLARK PAYS PENALTY

Hanged at Walla Walla at Dawn This Morning for Death of A. L. Bidwell

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 11, (AP)—Denton Hays ("Slim") Clark died on the gallows at the state penitentiary here at dawn today for the murder of A. L. Bidwell of Walla Walla, whom he poisoned in December, 1927, with the aid of Bidwell's wife.

Clark was brought from his cell in death row as the first glow of daylight appeared in the sky, and taken to the scaffold. The trap was sprung at 4:11 a. m., and Clark was pronounced dead by the prison physician 12 minutes later. Prison authorities said the body would probably be turned over to Clark's aged parents.

Closes Long Legal Battle The execution today marked the close of a long battle on the part of Clark and his friends to save him from the death penalty.

Arrested with Mrs. Bessie Bidwell shortly after Bidwell's death, he fought a losing battle through the courts. He was convicted and sentenced to death in the lower court, the sentence being sustained by the state supreme court. His friends then sought to avert the execution on the grounds that Clark was insane. Mrs. Bidwell was convicted of second degree murder for her part in the killing of her husband, and sentenced to serve ten years in the state penitentiary. She served a portion of her sentence, but was later removed to a state asylum for the insane, where she is now confined.

Vacation Ends in Drowning Accident

PORTLAND, July 11, (AP)—The second day of Mrs. Lue Cummings' vacation was her last day of life. She was drowned in the Columbia river near Goble, Ore., yesterday, when a speed boat overturned.

Her two companions, Clair Sitton, boat pilot, and Dave Brennan, were rescued by Charles Nelson, operating manager of the McCormick Steamship company. Mrs. Cummings, whose home address is unknown, resided at a hotel here six weeks.
