**Cut Worms Make Appearance  
In Some Districts of County**

Numerous reports of cut worm damage are being received daily at the county agent's office. A number of these cases have been investigated, showing the presence in some districts of the army cut worm and in other districts of the variegated cut worm. Both are commonly called cut worms, and damage in each case is similar. In some districts some grain loss has been experienced, particularly on wet lands. In other sections damage has been done to garden and truck crops, and in a few cases to alfalfa. More than likely considerable alfalfa damage will be reported on the young alfalfa after the first cutting is removed.

The most practical method of combatting cut worms is to use a poison bran mixed in exactly the same way as that used for grasshopper control, except that the poison mash is generally spread late in the evening after the sun goes down, as these worms usually work at night. However, in cooler weather, they sometimes work during the day time. For those having small gardens the following bait mixture is advised: Two level teaspoons of white arsenic or Paris green should be thoroughly mixed with from 4 to 6 quarts of water and a crushed orange or lemon added. This wet mixture should then be mixed with the dry mixture and stirred until a crumbly wet mash is formed. The proper degree of dampness can be arrived at by squeezing a handful of the mash. When moisture can be squeezed out between the fingers the mixture is sufficiently damp. The mash should be allowed to stand for an hour or two, and should then be thinly broadcasted over the infested ground. The rate of broadcasting should not exceed forty pounds per acre.

If cut worms are found on a large area, the following formula should be used: One sack of bran, one sack of sawdust, six pounds of arsenic or Paris green, mixed up thoroughly. A mixture should then be made of 1 1/2 gallons of low grade molasses or syrup with from 12 to 15 gallons of water. Add two ounces of banana oil. If this is not available a dozen crushed oranges or lemons will replace it. The wet mixture should then be added to the dry mixture until a uniform crumbly mass results. This should be spread over the infested area about sundown at the rate of 30 to 40 pounds per acre.

At this time cut worms are reported in abundance in all of southern Oregon. The last visit of this pest to Klamath county was about five years ago, when considerable damage was done to the new growth of the second cutting of alfalfa. They occur at periodic intervals, and seldom occur two years in succession. As the moths sometimes will fly great distances and deposit their eggs in an adjoining district or county, the eggs later hatch out into cut worms. The period of damage usually lasts from two to three weeks, or until the cut worms pass into the pupa stage, later to emerge as moths.

**ASTORIA, Ore., July 11. (AP)**—Charged with embezzlement of public funds, Frank Tuomala, Astoria precinct justice of the peace for ten years, was in jail today in lieu of \$5000 bonds.

The justice was jailed on complaint of G. Zeigler, accountant, who audited county books. Zeigler said an investigation of Tuomala's books revealed a shortage of \$12,000. The justice is charged specifically with the embezzlement of \$1500 deposited by Geo. Adams Seaside, as bail.

Tuomala refused comment.
