

MC DONALD LOCATED IN BALTIMORE

Witness at Mooney Trial Declares Testimony Was False

NEVER SAW MOONEY UNTIL TRIAL TIME

John McDonald, Aged 58, Makes Written Statement Before Attorney That Officers Pointed Out Mooney and Billings to Him; Desires to Undo Wrong.

BALTIMORE, July 12 (AP)—John McDonald, principal prosecution witness against Thomas Mooney and Warren K. Billings, serving life sentences for the preparedness day parade bombing in San Francisco in 1916, said today he had perjured himself at the trial and now desires to "undo the wrong."

Sought in connection with efforts of the Mooney defense league to obtain pardons for the two men, McDonald was taken into custody here after being recognized by a neighbor. He was held on a nominal charge of investigation.

After his arrest he issued a statement through an attorney in which he said:

Makes Statement

"I, John McDonald, aged 58 years, residing in Baltimore City, testified as a witness for the state of California versus Thomas Mooney and Warren K. Billings. I never saw Mooney until taken to the hall of justice in San Francisco and was told by an officer that this is Mooney (pointing him out to me). My testimony in the various cases was untrue and false. I desire to undo the wrong done by me in sending Mooney to prison regardless of personal consequences. The authorities got me to testify that I identified Mooney but this is an absolute falsehood."

Made Previous Affidavit

Five years after the conviction of Mooney and Billings, McDonald made an affidavit at Trenton, N. J., in which he said he was not positive of his identification in an effort to obtain pardons. In refusing to grant the latest pardon petition a few days ago, Governor C. C. Young of California indicated his decision might be reversed if McDonald were produced to repeat his repudiation before the governor and the supreme court.

McDonald cannot be compelled to return to California. His appearance before officials there would be voluntary as there are no charges against him and he cannot be extradited to obey a subpoena from the California supreme court.

Mooney was sentenced to death but the sentence was commuted. McDonald's apprehension was brought about through John C. Tauber who recognized a former boarder in his home when he saw a photograph of him yesterday. He informed police and accompanied three patrolmen to a lunch room in north Baltimore where Tauber said McDonald took his meals. McDonald was not in the restaurant but Tauber saw him on the street nearby shortly afterward and the officers took him into custody after McDonald had admitted his identity. He said he had been working as a telephone operator in a large apartment building.

Seek State Aid

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12, (AP)—While gasoline prices slowly rose here today in response to the announcement of major oil companies of a return to pre-war prices, independent dealer associations started plans seeking incorporation in the state civil code a section giving the state sole power to regulate prices.

Hundreds of stations withdrew price signs in a quandary as to proper prices, others changed their signs raising the figures 20 cent until the announced 20 cent minimum had been reached. It was felt generally, however, all stations would soon fall in line with the new figures.

Dealers Held Out

PORTLAND, July 12, (AP)—A lot of private oil companies apparently didn't know the gas price war had ended today. Motorists bought fuel from 9 1/2 to 21 1/2 cents a gallon here. Major oil companies, such as the Standard, Associated, Shell and Gilmore ended the price war as suddenly as it began by posting price signs today of 21 1/2 cents.

Texas, Richfield and others maintained the war price.

attributable to the week's heat in the middle west was 74 today, including downpours as well as deaths resulting from prostrations. In Iowa alone there have been 25 deaths in the past three days, and in Missouri 24 in the same period. Illinois, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Minnesota also reported deaths due to the heat.

Readings Above 100. Temperature readings of 100 or above have become usual rather than the exception in most of the middle American states.

St. Louis was the hottest metropolis of America yesterday, having an official 104. Sikeston, Mo., reported 112, the highest mark of the present wave. Other official readings for yesterday were: Des Moines, 100; Keokuk, 102; Kansas City, Mo., 100; Omaha, 102; Memphis, 102; Huron, S. D., 106, and Peoria, 102.

Chicago, Milwaukee and other lake shore cities continued to enjoy their strategic position, being fanned by cool breezes while sections inland sweltered.

GALLANT FOX WINS THRILLER

Desperate Duel Between Winner and Gallant Knight; Ned O 3rd

1 to 5 favorite in the betting, but paid \$2.64 to win the \$2 mutuel. Sande gave Gallant Fox a masterly ride, but at the end he was forced to use every resource at his command to keep his mount in front of Gallant Knight, which was receiving a wonderful ride from Schatts.

America's richest three-year-old purse—the \$70,000 added Arlington classic—today furnished an apparently easy short cut to the champion three-year-old, Gallant Fox, in his drive for a record as the greatest money-winning horse of all time.

Winning \$300,000

Victory in today's mile and a quarter, worth approximately \$70,000 to the winner, brought the winnings of the sensational son of Sir Galahad III-Marguerite to around the \$300,000 mark, and within striking distance of the earnings record of the great Sir Barton, a few who thought the Gallant Knight, second to the Fox in the Kentucky Derby, might head off the champion in his try for a sixth major 1930 stake.

Ned O Consistent

Ned O, show horse in the Churchill Downs feature, received some consideration as did the three fillies, Snowflake, Alcibiades and Dustmell, but the general feeling was that Gallant Fox would have to break a leg to lose. Overnight odds were 2 to 5.

The combination of the rich state and the opportunity of seeing the Fox and his veteran rider, Earl Sande, in action, aroused the greatest interest in horse racing in Chicago since the sport was revived.

Joseph as he swung into a final campaign. A month later, after his nomination, he dropped dead. He went to Convention.

It was then Oregon returned to the convention system. The job of making a nomination passed to the republican state central committee, composed of a committeeman from each county, elected at each primary. Of the 36 committeemen, 19 can form a majority and speak for Oregon's 287,000 registered republican voters.

Some of the defeated candidates seek the republican committee's nomination, which probably would be valid, but the situation has allowed a number of new names to creep into the picture.

Phil Metcalf, chairman of the state central committee, has been mentioned. So has Julius Meier, Portland department store owner. C. E. Gates, Medford, member of the state highway commission, Rufus Holman, Portland, and others, also have been named.

Sawyer Mentioned. Tom Kay, state treasurer and an Oregon political leader, is prominently mentioned as the standard bearer. After his defeat Norblad removed Robert J. Sawyer, Bend publisher, from the highway commission, but Sawyer's name is talked by politicians.

A third and final surprise, in a year of surprises, could be wrought by the state central committee in Portland, July 25, and bring forth a dark horse.
