LOST RIVER DAIRY HAS LARGE PLANT AND FLEET OF FAST TRUCKS IN CITY

How often when the customer adds the pure cream to his morning coffee does the thought occur to him that milk and cream have any other attention or care other than that given the bovine famous in nursery rhymes as having made a non-stop flight over the moon.

A short visit to the plant of the Lost River dairy at Seventh and Oak streets of this city should convince anyone that while nature did a magnificent job in equipping the cow for the production of the feast of children and necessary adjunct to breakfast food, there is far more to its arrival at the doorstep than just drawing at the source of supply, bottling and delivering.

On entering the plant the visitor is met by R. C. Woodruff, manager, from whom was obtained the information that the Lost River dairy purchases the raw commodity only after careful personal inspection of the dairy itself. Along with this close check, the farmers are co-operated with in every way to help them produce the finest of milk.

It is next learned that all milk delivered by this company is pasteurized. Milk pasteurization does not make poor milk good, neither does it make good milk better, but it makes good milk safe and keeps it good and safe, it was stated. The use of pasteurization by this dairy is one of the many extra precautions used to aid in the care of community health.

One's breath is fairly taken away by the magnitude of the task of getting the bottle of milk to

the private home in the proper condition. The bottling machines bottle and cap at the rate of 50, a minute, 900 gallons of milk goes through the three pasteurizers at once, and all bottles and cans are sterilized and washed. This latter process being automatic as is every other in the plant. Only the latest and most modern of machinery and equipment is used.

A staff of 20 employees, numbering among them a bacteriologist, chemist and experts in every branch of the business are employed by this company, which also operates a fleet of seven trucks.

It is a smiling saying around the Lost River plant that they are raising the future citizens of Klamath Falls.

SEARCH PARTY ENTERS DENSE JUNGLE TODAY

Hope To Find British Flier Left Behind By Buddy

RANGOON, Burma, July 14, (A.P.)—Searching parties penetrating the Southern Burmese jungle today hoped to find Erik Hook, British aviator, left dying last week by a buddy, Jimmie Matthews, who stumbled on, he said, to find help for both of them.

Little hope was held for success of the quest. Matthews himself, bruised and worn from the crash of their England-to-Australia airplane ten days ago and the subsequent march to civilization, discouraged hope. The jungle where he left Hook is known for its predatory wild beasts and hyenas.

Plane Cracked Up

Matthews Saturday reached Prom, 160 miles north of Rangoon, on the left bank of the Irrawaddy river, with the story that he and Hook cracked up their plane on a mountain side July 3, while flying between Akyah, Burma, and Rangoon, in an attempt to beat the 15-day flight record from England to Australia.

Both were injured in the crash, but Hook much more severely. Matthews said in the next few days as they tried to reach civilization he was forced to carry the more badly hurt man on his back. Finally, beset by hunger, thirst, and the damp, dismal malarial country through which they passed, they decided it would be best for him to go on alone and seek help, even though Hook was left to die.

Hook Left Dying

Matthews said Hook was in a dying condition when finally he left him. After some time he himself was found by a group of vil-

lage hunters, who fed him, and took him to Prom.

Matthews said their plane struck the top of the bamboo clump. They were able to slide down the spikes to safety, but the machine was hopelessly wrecked.

They decided the best chance of finding help would be to follow the course of the Buro river, and on the seventh day Hook became so ill they both decided their own chance lay in Matthews' going on ahead.
