DEMPSEY WILL MAKE BUT ONE STOP IN STATE

Klamath Falls Only City Engaging Services of Famous Mauler

Klamath Falls will have the distinction of being the first city under 100,000 population to show Jack Dempsey in person. The famous mauler has heretofore given exhibitions in the large cities only, but owing to his train schedule and the fact that this little city has a reputation as a fight center, he has consented to appear here as referee.

The Dempsey party will arrive in Klamath Falls Monday morning on the Cascade and the ex-champ will spend part of the day on a fishing trip, probably to Harry Poole's Sunnyside farm at Chillico. As this is to be his only stop in Oregon it is his desire and that of local people sponsoring his visit that he get a taste of Oregon trout.

Klamath Falls, Dempsey goes directly to Seattle to referee a big-time card in the Washington city.

Interest in Bout. That Tex has started something with a bang to it is evidenced in the fact that an order for thirty ringside seats has been received from a group of fight fans in Weed. Orders are also coming in from other points and Tex is busy making the time telling fans what he believes will be the best place to sit in order to see the fight. That the house will be a sell out now seems particularly assured. Four hundred ringside seats will be arranged on the stage, giving the effect of a regular arena.

Because of the nature of the attraction—the referee and the 35 rounds of high class fighting—it has been necessary to raise the price. This was not done until the management of the theatre and the matchmaker assured themselves that it was fully justified and necessary. No town on the coast is getting such advertising as Klamath Falls is from this special show and the loyalty of the fans is counted upon to make the affair a success. Dempsey himself is the most popular prize fighter in the world today. In the big cities, and wherever he goes, there is always a crowd at his heels. No man can draw the money in the fight game that Jack Dempsey can draw, and if the ex-champ decides to step back into the ring and try to bring the crown back to America there is every reason to believe that he will fill the biggest arena erected for that purpose.

So there is every reason to believe that Poole's Pelican Theatre will be crowded to capacity next Monday evening.

Don't Overlook Card. But don't allow Dempsey to overshadow the fight card itself. It could be of little benefit to a wide-spread fight fan to see third man in the ring if the card itself was a washout. Tex has guarded against this very thing and pulled together some of the snappiest fighters on the coast.

Klamath fans like to see plenty of action, and they are guaranteed plenty of satisfaction in this super card Tex has pulled together. Altogether, it looks like a big night on July 21.

British Ship to Dispense Liquor At Races Report

NEW YORK, July 15, (AP)—Rumors that a ship flying the British flag plans to dispense liquor to its passengers outside the 12-mile limit during the international yacht races next September have evoked a protest from the American Steamship Owners' association.

H. B. Walker, president, said the association would appeal to the commission of navigation. He said he had heard the Royal Mail line planned to station the Aragua on the race course off Newport, R. I., during the day and make trips outside the 12-mile limit at night when liquor would be available to the passengers.

The Aragua under the liquor treaty with Great Britain is permitted to bring liquor into American ports under seal.

Walker said: "Of course I do not know whether this will be a wet or a dry ship on the occasion, but rumors are camels will not constitute the cargo."

SEATTLE, July 15, (AP)—Joe Anderson, Covington, Ky., won an eight round decision over Wesley (KO) Ketchell of Salt Lake City in the main event of a boxing show here last night. They battled to a draw in a fight here last month.

Klamath Pelicans And Pear Pickers Hold Track Meet

From all accounts, the baseball game at Medford Sunday between the Klamath Pelicans and the Medford Pear Pickers resembled a track meet more than the good old national pastime. At least, the score indicates that there was more racing around the bases than anything else, the final result being 19 to 17 in favor of the Pelicans.

The Medford Mail Tribune says it was a wild and woolly ball game from start to finish, interspersed with sensational catches and pathetic errors. There was a fair sized crowd present and what was scheduled to be the best game of the season turned out to be the wildest.

Continuing, the Mail Tribune says:

The locals scored 15 runs in the first three innings and apparently had the game on ice. This early show of strength was featured by a one-handed catch of a hard drive by Markle in right field. Later in the game Harry Dunn, at short, caught a slider off his shoe tops.

Klamath Falls showed a burst of speed in the middle of the game and scored 11 runs in three innings to become dangerous, while the best the locals could do was to garner two runs after their early spurge. The longer the visitors played the stronger they showed. They used four pitchers and finally one halted the local "murderers' row," which did all its murdering at the start of the game.

The Pelicans were clouting Cliff Best right smart when he was relieved by Jack Hughes in the seventh. That young man was wild and nervous, and before the side could be retired five runs had been scored. In the next inning he reversed himself and struck out three men in a row. However, his team-mates were feeble in the field and with the stick.

In the ninth Klamath tied the score with three runs and the game went into an extra session. Neither side scored in the tenth, but in the eleventh the winning run crossed the plate with a long drive to the right field.

Arriving from Europe aboard the Majestic yesterday, Queen Helen plans a quick dash home to Berkeley, Calif., before returning to New York to defend her United States title at Forest Hills starting August 15.

Will Go On Playing. To suggestions she was getting ready to retire after winning ten straight major singles titles, Mrs. Moody returned an emphatic denial. "I shall go on playing tennis indefinitely," she remarked.

"It has been a lovely trip," she added, "but I am eager to be home and plan to leave for California almost at once. I will be back in New York a week in advance of the National championship."

Most of Mrs. Moody's purchases abroad were furnishings for her home rather than the Paris gowns she has been accustomed to bring home with her.

MAKING WEIGHT IS PROBLEM OF YOUNG MANDELL

NEW YORK, July 15, (AP)—The question of whether Sammy Mandell still can make 135 pounds without materially weakening himself will have to wait for answer until 21:30 today night when the lightweight king defends his title against Al Singer of the Bronx.

At Orangeburg, N. Y., where the champion is training, they announced yesterday that Sammy was under the class limit but skeptical critics took leave to doubt it. They were of the opinion that the title-holder would need two days of boiling out to make sure that he would tip the beam at no more than 135 pounds when the boxers weigh in at the Yankee stadium Thursday afternoon.

Trounces McLarnin. Two years ago before Mandell met Jimmy McLarnin reports were current that the champion was having all kinds of trouble making the weight but he came in at the class limit and gave McLarnin an artistic trouncing in the bargain.

Millions of Fish Saved by Wet Hands

Millions of small fish may be saved this summer to grow into large fish if anglers will follow one simple rule—wet the hands thoroughly when taking little fish off the hook preparatory to releasing them back to the waters, Carlos Avery, president of the American Game Protective Association states. "Of course the small fish should be handled gently and released under water, not thrown back. A dry hand disturbs the protective film of the fish. If this is broken, fungi attach to the body of the fish and eventually kills it. Thousands of anglers that have been waiting their hands declare that millions of small fish have already been saved by this practice," Mr. Avery declared.

CHICAGO, July 15, (AP)—It's no laughing matter when 3,000 high school boys are refused free entry to a ball park, especially when Babe Ruth is one of the attractions, and more particularly when 10,000 other kids have gone past the gates on the same kind of passes held by the unhappy youngsters on the outside.

In such a situation, 3,000 Crane high school students took the only course they could think of yesterday: they started a fair-sized riot at Comiskey park. Fifty police, hurried from a nearby station, were helpless to halt the boys and the storming of the gates continued until the management ordered them admitted.

Then the secret of the trouble came out: A Chicago alderman had provided tickets today for 13,000 boys, but 3,000 of them had not been properly signed by owner Comiskey.
