Bran Mixture Given to Kill Cut Worm Pest

The county agent's office yesterday issued the following formula for a bran mixture to poison cut worms which have been causing some damage in the county recently:

- 1 sack bran.
- 1 sack sawdust.
- 6 pounds of arsenic or Paris green; mix thoroughly.
- 1 1/2 gallons of molasses or syrup.
- 12 to 15 gallons of water.
- 2 ounces of banana oil or a dozen oranges or lemons crushed.

Add wet mixture to dry mixture until a uniform crumbly mash results. Spread over infested area early in the morning or in the evening at the rate of 30 to 40 pounds per acre.

SLEEPING BEAR PUTS PARTY OF GIRLS TO ROUT

CRATER LAKE, Ore., July 15, (Special)—"Have you ever been held up by a bear?" This is the experience that many of the tourists who visited Crater Lake National park have had recently.

Bruno, a 350 pound black bear, after years of experience in rustling a living, has finally decided that holding up tourists along the road is an easier way of securing a living than by using the regular bear methods.

Often when he has finally reached his capacity he will seat himself by the side of the road and size up the visitors as they pass to and from the lake.

Curiosity Satisfied
Recently four young ladies from Minnesota, seeing the bear taking his afternoon nap, were unable to decide whether the animal was alive or mounted, so after some deliberations, determined to investigate.

The girls stopped the car and securing their kodaks started toward Bruno when suddenly the bear decided to meet the party, at least, halfway. When he lifted his head the girls were speechless with amazement and fright. Further movement on the part of the bear toward them was too much for the girls and they fled in some manner, quite unknown, the girls were able to get into the car and reach the checking station where they recovered from their terror and were able to tell their story.

Bruno, wondering what caused the sudden flight of the curious ones, blinked his small pig like eyes, and returned to his favorite shady spot and resumed his after lunch siesta.

Divine Healing on Tonight's Program

Swimming Class Schedules Given

The schedule of classes in swimming at the New Klamath Natatorium was announced this morning by Miss Puckett.

Children from 5 to 12 years of age will be given instruction from 8 to 9 o'clock in the forenoon, while adult classes will be held from 9 until 10, with classes for the older boys and girls following from 10 until 11.

The classes are open to a limited number in order that it will be possible to give a great deal of individual instruction. For those who already can swim work will be concentrated on perfection of the various strokes.

An evening class may be organized later for those who are not free for morning classes.

Use Big Hooks to Save Small Fish

If anglers would make a practice of using large-sized fish hooks thousands of small fish would be saved, the American Game Protective Association's observers report. It is illegal to take undersized fish. Besides, the majority of fishermen do not want small fish. They are put back into the water after they are taken from the hook. Many of them die from injuries.

Those fishing with worms, meat or live bait should use a large-size hook so the smaller fish cannot swallow or impale themselves upon it. It is the small hook that does the damage. Fly fishermen who use small hooks are not usually troubled with small fish, for they seldom strike.

MILWAUKEE.—A survey of 150 Wisconsin cities has shown that there are 48 landing fields for airplanes within the state. Fourteen of these airports, 15 landing fields, and 35 emergency fields. It is estimated that approximately \$2,500,000 is invested in these fields and equipment.
