Maklaks Burn Reaches Within Three Miles Of Lake Reservoir

North and west of Klamath county officials stated today that the Klamath fire has burned all the way out and no new fires have been reported for several days.

A number of small fires were started the first of the week, but these were under control in a short time.

Lookouts are stationed in various places throughout the county, however, to report any possible fire outbreaks.

One hundred men from Klamath Falls and 50 from Lakeview and all men available from Klamath and Deschutes counties were rushed from here late Tuesday to a fire 21 miles west of Crescent, which broke all lines late in the afternoon and was burning over 15,000 acres in jack pine and brush. Late this afternoon the fire was reported under control.

Sheep Dogs to Be Shown at Fair by Malin Sheep Man

Of interest to sheepmen of Klamath county is the announcement that W. M. Downing of Malin, well known Klamath county resident, will give an exhibition of working sheep dogs during the Klamath county fair, September 13, 14 and 15.

Downing will also offer prizes for working sheep dogs, and has arranged for three places. He has a number of sheepmen who have announced their intentions of entering their dogs in this interesting phase of the fair.

The policy of the fair board will be carried out to the letter this year, that of making each successive fair larger and wider in scope. An additional special added to the premium list was announced yesterday by Mrs. Leda Parker, secretary and manager of the 1930 fair. A class for range lambs, with six lambs to constitute an exhibit, will be among the new premiums. Four places will be considered.

Attractions for amusement and entertainment have also been included, and Captain Jack G. Williams, the original Barnum & Bailey circus clown, will be on the grounds during the three days of the fair to amuse old and young alike. There will also be a novelty whistler, a comedy acrobat, and an official announcer that were not included in last year's program.

Village Platform Will Be Used For Outdoor Dancing

Announcement was made this morning by Elbert S. Veatch, that the outdoor dancing pavilion built by the Elks lodge and the American Legion for their days of '48 show, will be operated during the remainder of the summer season, starting tomorrow night.

Baldy Evans' orchestra, under management of Dewey Powell, has been given the management of the pavilion, which is to be known as the "Village Platform," and is located on Klamath avenue at Second street. It is planned to have dances every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday nights, with the first official opening dance tomorrow evening. The dance will be known as a combination affair, as stated by Mr. Powell; that is, one may dance at 10 cents per dance or three tickets for 25 cents, or they may buy an admission ticket and dance the entire evening for \$1.

Traffic is very light on this part of Klamath avenue, and there is plenty of parking space, so that spectators may park their cars and watch the dancing and listen to the music. Bright lights will make the Village Platform a spectacle and dancing under natural moonlight may also be enjoyed.

Doing Assessment Work at Chemult

W. A. T. Akard of Berkeley, Calif., was transacting business in Klamath Falls today in connection with his pumice claims near Chemult. Mr. Akard has 230 acres of land one mile north of Chemult upon which are extensive deposits of pumice stone and sand. He has kept his assessment work up on these claims for several years, looking forward to the time when a favorable market would be found for the raw product. That time has about arrived, for pumice is found invaluable in radio and talkie studio work. It also is being used extensively in stucco and other building materials.

will appear, much greater and more permanent than ever before. Characterizing the present as an "economic zero hour," she said, "For the past eight years every aim has been for money, prosperity, the acquisition of things, such as motor cars, the evidence of wealth. We went to extremes to get quickly what we had previously done without, like liquor, luxury, pleasure."

Recounting accomplishments of the Hoover administration, Mrs. Willebrandt observed: "This last winter has been a hectic political time. The mud-slingers, sarcasm manufacturers and editorial croakers have had an inning. But the president has not permitted himself to be deflected from either the methods which are peculiarly his own or the aims he believes to be right."

Hoover Can Fight

Mr. Hoover, she added, cannot perform, because he is too busy. "He avoids a fight as long as possible," she said, "but when it becomes the only alternative he gives 'em hell'."

On April 1, 1930, a week before the primary election, he said Mrs. McCormick informed him this check arrived too late for use in the campaign, but the money had not been returned to him.

The publisher at first included another contribution of \$2,000 in his testimony regarding the senatorial campaign, but later corrected himself by saying that sum was given to her campaign for congresswoman at large.

The inquiry thus far has disclosed the senatorial nomination cost Mrs. McCormick and her supporters \$227,000, of which amount the nominee herself supplied \$252,000 and accounted for an additional \$67,500.

Small Discrepancy Found

Senator Nye said hearings so far had shown that, while Mrs. McCormick insisted her campaign reports accounted for all expenditures, that there was at least \$7,000 not included in her figures.

Testimony before the committee yesterday indicated Frederick W. Allen, a New York broker, was the largest contributor to her campaign, having given \$20,000 to one of the volunteer organizations which supported Mrs. McCormick. Mr. Allen and the late Senator McMill McCormick, Mrs. McCormick's husband, were schoolmates.

ship was out of control. The visibility was bad, so we took to the chutes and let her fall." Help reached the fliers soon after they landed about a mile west of Bozwick.

The plane originally was built by Eddie Stinson for an assault on the endurance, non-refueling flight record, now held by Germany. "I must tell you that my husband does not like routine. He prefers to think that he is free to live each day exactly as he wishes. He likes order only in his thinking. In his life he likes it not at all!"

Mrs. Einstein also had been married previously, and by her first marriage had two daughters. Talented and charming, they are now members of the professor's household and he is enormously fond of them.
