Klamath's second midget golf course has been completed and will be open for play today at Altamont camp ground, about one mile south of this city. It was announced last night by Tom Ingram, owner of the camp.

The course contains 18 holes, which are cleverly placed among hazards and on greens. The tall poplar trees which have established a reputation for the camp as being one of the coolest in southern Oregon provide shade for the course. Powerful lights illuminate it for night playing.

The course will accommodate 50 players at one time. Clubs, balls and score pads are provided at the gate. An attendant will be on hand at all hours to give instruction to those desiring it.
