MILITTI WORKS OUT AT LEGION ARENA TONIGHT

Italian Terror To Box Eight Rounds With Sparring Partners

Milittio Militti, Italian, terror of the Pacific coast, arrived in Klamath Falls yesterday to prepare for his bout with Young Sam Langford on Tex Bickers' staff's super fight card to be staged at Peola's Pelican theatre Monday evening.

This young son of sunny Italy is a handsome chap, much too handsome to have his face exposed to the kind of punishment administered in the prize ring, but that evidently doesn't worry him. He is a 17-year-old boy from Omaha, Mo., and takes what's coming to him and while doing that gives the other guy something to think about. Out of 41 fights, Militti has taken 39, mostly by the lasso route. Not a bad record for one of his years. And he gets no setups—he has to fight for the honors he gets.

Militti will work out this evening at the Legion arena. The workout starts at 5:00 and the public is welcome to look in on the practice. He will go eight fast rounds with his sparring partners and if the fans want to get a slant on what this chap will do against Thummy they will get a good opportunity to size him up.

All the boys on the card will be on hand at the pavilion this evening and a worth while show will be staged.

The Italian boy takes his profession seriously. He has no bad habits such as drinking, smoking or playing around. Wherever he appears he is always welcome back. His manager, Earl Mann, popular sportsman of San Francisco, refused a \$5000 cash offer for his protegee's contract. In his coming battle with our Young Sam Langford, popular colored veteran, Militti is confident of winning. Sam is in the best of shape now and will show at his best Monday evening. This bout is scheduled to go 10 rounds at 145 pounds.

Show Stealer
The fight that may steal the show is the Shrimp McDonald-Billy Ryan 10-round bout. A lot of the wise ones are sending in their money on Ryan, figuring his experience will bowl the Lakeview sensation over in less than five rounds. But it must not be forgotten that this boy has done everything asked of him so far and that he is rated a comer by all fast wise people who have seen him in action.

If Shrimp gets over Ryan his services will be in demand all over the Pacific coast. A large crowd of Lakeview backers will be at the ring side to urge their favorite to victory.

Portlanders Coming
Billy Ryan is authorities for the statement that a large number of Portlanders will come to Klamath Falls Monday to see Dempsey and take in the super fight card. Although no orders for reservations have come from Portland so far, the local management is expecting a draft for a reserved section.

The Portland crowd won't be disappointed in the card. Besides the two 10-round main events, Steamboat Jackson will mix six rounds with Chet Wilkins and Battling Leo Burns will step six rounds with Joe Dagnuta, Vancouver Barracks champion. The pride of Portland, Johnny Snell will have an insight into the ways of Indian warfare in a four-round go with Finley Wilson, who has licked everything in sight in the land of the Klamaths.

Coast Directors Discussing Draft Agreement Today

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18. (AP)—Directors of the Pacific Coast League will meet here today to discuss the universal draft, the new baseball agreement recently demanded by the National and American Leagues. At present, the coast circuit, along with two other class AA and two class A leagues, have a modified draft agreement with the majors. Under the universal draft plan, big league clubs would have the privilege of claiming any one player instead of only those with previous major experience as is the case now.

Three clubs, San Francisco Seals, Oakland and Sacramento, are known to be opposed to the new draft proposition while it is understood the San Francisco Missions also will vote against it. The Los Angeles team, owned by William Wrigley of the Chicago Cubs, favors the draft. The attitude of directors of the Portland, Seattle and Hollywood clubs, on the question is not known.

Several years ago, the Coast league voted against the universal draft.

Firpo Spends \$165 To Congratulate Saurez on Fight

NEW YORK, July 18. (AP)—Luis Angel Firpo, "The Wild Bull of the Pampas," was one of the first to congratulate Justo Saurez, Argentine fighter, who won from Joe Gluck in a preliminary at the Singer-Mandell no last night.

The congratulations cost Firpo, who is known as one of the thriest figures in the ring, just about \$165, for to offer them he had to call by telephone from Buenos Aires. He kept the line for 15 minutes, conversing with Saurez, his manager, Jose Lactorre, and with Jimmy DeForest, a veteran fight handler.

Firpo told DeForest he was coming to New York next month, and that he might fight here. "You will be my trainer," Firpo told him. DeForest was so overcome with emotion he cried.

After Saurez defeated Gluck the Argentine fighter spoke over the Trans-Oceanic Telephone hook-up to the office of La Critica, Buenos Aires, where his impressions of his bout were carried by loud speakers to many thousands gathered in all directions for three blocks about the office of the newspaper. It was estimated La Critica paid about \$2,900 for the arrangement.

Senators Start Losing Streak When They Start Western Trip

The current Western trip of the eastern clubs is proving rather painful to the Washington Senators, but profitable to the rest. The Senators started a losing streak when they started west, and the result has dropped them clear out of first place and into a somewhat precarious second.

The Senators left home as the league leaders, and now are 2 1/2 games behind first place and only four ahead of the third place New York Yankees. They split a series with Detroit and so far have dropped two out of three to Cleveland, while their rivals have been sweeping through in a steady stream of victories. Washington dropped another close encounter yesterday, going down 4 to 3 before the Indians, as Eddie Merhan's batting gave the home team the edge in a mound duel between Willis Hudlin and Sam Jones. Morgan drove in three runs with a home run and a single.

A's Make 7 Straight

The champions and leaders, the Philadelphia Athletics, made 11 seven straight wins, six in the west, by plugging out another victory over the Chicago White Sox, 12 to 8. The Yankees sided themselves and the Boston Red Sox as well by hammering the St. Louis

The first three clubs of the second division drew a bit closer together in their private race, as Pittsburgh gained a 6 to 2 decision over the Boston Braves and the Cincinnati Reds played havoc with Philadelphia pitching for a 14 to 9 victory.

Singer Wins Crown in One Short Round

NEW YORK, July 18. (AP)—The crown of the lightweights today adorns the thick black thatch of 21-year-old Al Singer, whose sensational one-round knockout of Sammy Mandell last night brought back the 132-pound championship to New York for the first time since Benny Leonard retired.

The boy from the Bronx, and protege of Leonard, making his little bit at the Yankee stadium, crushed Mandell, champion for four years, in one minute and 16 seconds. A crowd of 25,000 witnessed the match.

Floored Four Times

Singer floored Mandell four times for successive counts of two, seven, four and ten, and the champion took the final count flat on his back.

Mandell did not land a solid punch, and was punched into a state of helplessness before he had time to make even a gesture. He bore no resemblance to the fighter who two years ago beat so dangerous a puncher as Jimmy McLarnin. He won applause from the crowd only for his gameness.

It was the shortest lightweight title fight in history, and one of the quickest knockouts in any championship fight since Terry McGovern swarmed over Pedlar Palmer to win in something like a half minute about forty years ago.
