SIX COUPLES WANT DIVORCES

Circuit Court To Hear Marital Woes of Various Types

Six complaints for divorce were filed yesterday in the office of the clerk of the circuit court. Four charged cruel and inhuman treatment and two charged desertion.

Frances D. Nelson filed suit against L. E. Nelson whom she married in Roseburg, January 27, 1929. She charges cruel and inhuman treatment and asks the return of her maiden name, Frances D. Hubert.

Arvie Cummings seeks to have the bonds of matrimony which bind her to Jerome C. Cummings severed on alleged grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment and asks the return of her maiden name of Arvie O'Dell. She also seeks \$29 a month alimony. They were married in Klamath Falls on July 3, 1929.

J. A. Palmer asserts that his wife, Stella G. Palmer deserted him on July 13, 1929, and asks a decree of divorce. They were married in Los Angeles, Calif., on November 21, 1927. He asks the custody of a minor son.

Luther G. Perkins filed suit against Augusta Perkins whom he married in Huntington, Oregon, on October 15, 1920. He charges cruel and inhuman treatment.

Edna M. Turner asks that she be freed from matrimonial ties binding her to Walter A. Turner whom she married in Klamath Falls on June 21, 1911. She charges desertion and cruel and inhuman treatment.

Daisy Morin filed suit for a divorce decree from Leo J. Morin charging desertion on December 13, 1927. She asks the care and custody of a minor child and \$25 a month for its support. They were married in Spokane, Wash., on December 31, 1912.
