## FIGHT PREVIEW SCHEDULED AT LEGION ARENA

All Boys on Card Will Be Shown at 1:00 o'Clock Sunday

Promptly at 1:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon all the boys on the fight card for Monday night's big show at the Pelican theatre will appear at the Legion arena in a preview. This show is free to the public and will be over in time for fighters and crowd to get to the opening of the baseball game at the fair grounds.

All of the boys are training faithfully for the super card that Tex Bickerstaff has arranged, with Jack Dempsey the main drawing card as referee. Millio Militti started putting on the last finishing touches last night and will be in condition to give Young Sam Langford a tough go.

Militti is 19 years old, will enter the ring at 148 pounds and has had 41 fights. He is an Italian and proud of it, likes spaghetti (Oh, my boy, and how!) but it is a poor training diet and Militti puts conditions above everything else. Before turning professional Militti won the National A. A. U. Midwest Golden Glove Tournament at Chicago in 1928. After turning professional he won 39 fights in a row before dropping a decision in 10 rounds to Jimmie Owens of Chicago.

**Fights Real Boys**  
The Dago boy was fouled three times and refused to win or lose in this manner. He stuck to his guns although greatly weakened and at the end of the tenth session had to suffer the agony of seeing his opponent's hand raised. To prove the quality of Militti's adversary, Owens, the fact that Owens has beaten My Sullivan, drew with Jackie Fields and gave a fancy shellacking to Mushy Callahan, it is not hard to judge the class of Militti. Militti has beaten such boys as Red McDonald of Sacramento in 10 rounds, Elgin Moore in 10 rounds, Dode Berout of Seattle in eight rounds, and Al Olson, sensational Oakland boy, in 10 rounds. In the Olson fight the Oakland boy had been victorious in 21 straight starts and Militti had copped in 10 straight, so someone had to lose in this natural.

**Langford Training Hard**  
Langford in his usual quiet manner is going ahead with his work, hitting the road early with Benny Dyson and boxing with the same Benny. Sam declares Benny the best in the division and Benny is diligently training and will challenge the winner of the Ryan-McDonald fracas for the next show. Langford needs no introduction to local fans. A boy who is always trying, always busy, fights clean and wins, lose or draw, there is never a squawk from Sam. Regardless of the impressive record of Militti, the wise birds are assuming that "we shall see what we shall see" attitude and Sam will be at all lacking in supporters.

Billy Ryan, who swaps slugs with Shrimp McDonald in the other main event, arrived in town yesterday. Ryan has just recently made a sensational comeback after years in the ring and then retirement. In his last start in Portland he stopped Jokanie Snell, who also appears a little lower down on the card. Ryan hails from Albion, where they grow tough and has a right hand that is dynamite.

**Lake Backs McDonald**  
It is just a question whether or not the Irishman can reach the winners of the clever Shrimp with one of his hefty rights. McDonald will pull half of Lakeview with him in this set-to but of course some of the populace from the Lake town will be on hand to glimpse the ever popular Dempsey. A ticket order from McDonald yesterday amounted to \$155 in real (not phoney) money so it is not hard to see how seriously the Lakeview folks take this coming show.

In a six-round special event, Arthur (Steamboat) Jackson will face Chat Wilkins. No, we never heard of Wilkins either, but not sporting fraternity knows all about the willing old trial trotter Steamboat. One would have to look high and far to find a more popular boy than Jackson. In the other two scuffles, Austin Rosander meets Joe Dagutis for six rounds and Finley Wilson crosses bats with Johnnie Snell. Rosander is well known for his hefty wallop with both manly fists. Dagutis hails from up north and has gotten some good fights out of his system battling in the small towns. Johnny Snell has it on Finley Wilson in experience but Finley may be able to catch more than Johnny can.

**Tickets are on sale at the Pelican theatre box office. Prices for the choice perches range from a pedro down to one buck.**  
A preview of all the fighters will be held at 1 o'clock sharp on Sunday at the Legion Arena. Every boy on the card will be on exhibition there and from that spot they will go in a body to the ball yard.

## Manassa Mauler to Referee Klamath Falls Fight Card

While having retired from the ring following his defeat by Gene Tunney, Dempsey is still rated good enough to take most of the heavy contenders and it is the opinion of many followers of the

fight game that he is the logical man to bring the title back to the United States. The Manassa Mauler has never let down training to the point where he can't get in shape in due season. For that reason it is believed that he harbors a desire to recapture the title before that enemy of all athletes—time—disqualifies him.

Dempsey's appearance in Klamath Falls will be the only one in the state and his coming is attracting attention from a large territory. Orders for ringside seats are still pouring in and indications point to a full house when the gong rings for the curtain raiser Monday evening.

## Second Division of National League Waging Own Warfare

Almost unnoticed amid the tumult and shouting over the Brooklyn-Chicago battle for first place in the National League, there is a stirring bit of baseball warfare going on in the second division of the circuit with Pittsburgh, Boston and Cincinnati involved in a three-way struggle for the best position.

Pittsburgh's Pirates are on top the second division today holding fifth place by a half game margin by virtue of yesterday's 12 to 4 triumph over the Boston Braves. Cincinnati, victorious over the humble Phillies, 13 to 6, still are in seventh place but only a half game behind the Braves.

**Home Runs Feature**  
Home runs were the big feature with Chuck Klein hitting his 27th for Philadelphia and Hellmann, Stripp and Meusel connecting for Cincinnati's four baggers.  
Chicago's Cubs likewise used the home run route as they clipped Brooklyn's lead to a single game by winning the fourth game by their "crucial" series, 6 to 2. Hack Wilson, Clyde Beck and Woody English clouted homers to account for four of Chicago's runs while Del Bisenette's four base blow was the only real wallop of the five hits the Robins made off the delivery of Sheriff Fred Blake.  
New York's Giants want a long way toward settling their dispute with St. Louis over third place by rallying for five runs in the ninth inning to win the second in a row, 8 to 7.  
**Browns Trim Yanks**  
The lowly St. Louis Browns provided the big thrill of the American League's day as they blew a seven game losing streak sky high at the expense of the New York Yankees. The Browns started hitting and scoring in the first inning and, refusing to be intimidated by the great Babe Ruth, who made his 33rd home run, or Lou Gehrig, who clouted his 25th, they didn't stop until the eighth, rolling up a 14 to 6 score. Boston Red Sox lost a 7-6 decision to Detroit as the Tigers found Milton Gaston for six of their runs in the fourth inning. A 6-8 Straight.
