Mrs. S. H. Keller of 522 Walnut left last evening for Oakland where she will spend a brief time visiting friends.

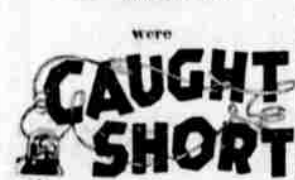

ST. LOUIS, July 19. (AP)—Home-brewing promises to figure prominently in the race for the republican nomination for prosecuting attorney here. Recently there have been reports one of the leading candidates for the nomination had been telling voters if he was elected home-brew makers would not be disturbed. Now Harry H. Richards, another candidate, has made his attitude quite clear. "I am not running for home-brew inspector," he said last night at a meeting of the Fifteenth ward voters. "At no time has any prosecuting attorney ever issued a warrant for a home-brew maker in St. Louis. If an assistant under me in the office ever did issue such a warrant I would prosecute the assistant, and not the home-brew maker."
