

Fighters All Set for Super Card Tonight

PREVIEW SHOWS GALA ARRAY OF FISTIC TALENT

Whole Card Presented at Legion Arena Sunday, Minus Shrimp McDonald, and Every Man Ready to Do His Best in Presence of Former World's Champion Heavyweight, Jack Dempsey.

With most of the boxers parading before the critical eye of the fight public yesterday afternoon at the Legion Arena, each gladiator declared himself to be in the proverbial pink. The big event in fisticuffs will be concluded tonight at Poole's Coliseum Theatre where Joe Bickerstaff and Harry Poole have arranged what is undoubtedly the choicest boxing morsel ever offered in Southern Oregon. Jack Dempsey, still the idol of every fight lover in the country, will still hold in the hearts of a great majority as the world's champion heavyweight, will be the third man in the ring. Dempsey arrived this morning from the south on the "Cascadia" and despite the early hour was met by a large throng of people eager to get a word and handshake from the popular and gracious Jack.

Shrimp Not Present
As mentioned above the fighters were all on dress parade at one o'clock yesterday and while they did not don the ring togs, each looked the picture of condition. Shrimp McDonald was the only "big shot" not to appear but this young gentleman will always be found in condition no matter where he trains. That McDonald is in for a stormy evening is attested by the fact that his opponent Billy Ryan, can hit. In a workout Saturday afternoon this same Ryan put a much heavier opponent flat on his back with a straight left to the body. If Ryan can hit like this with his left, when his right is supposed to be the old "Betsy Ann" it looks like the Lakeview view will either have to keep his chops covered or go to the canvas.

Millie Looks Great
Millie Millitt, who meets Young Sam Langford in the other half of the double header, certainly looks better on the face of his gym showing than any of the imported variety of cauliflower specialists. Millie's manager, Bick has imported, magnificently built for a boxer, fast, clever and strong, this Italian youth of 19 summers gladdens the eye of the boxing fandom. If he does not make an instant hit with those who are fortunate enough to see him go then something is wrong somewhere. In addition to having his manager, Earl Mann, in his corner, Millitt will have the benefit of the experience of a stablemate, Wesley Ketchel, to pour words of advice into his ear between rounds. Ketchel arrives today and will most likely be introduced from the ring.

Young Sam Langford, who meets Millitt, tapered off with several fast rounds with the clever Benny Dyson. Sam is one of those rare individuals who is tough, clever and can sock. He is always in condition and the most stringent discipline Sam indulged in is a long cigar now and then and perhaps, at intervals, heavy slugs of chicken.

Wilkins Not Known
Little is known locally of Chet Wilkins who matches Jack with Steamboat Jackson in the special. He is said to be a real good boy and will have to be successfully lashed the steamboat to the dock. Jackson, as always, is ready to go. The Steamboat had one bad eye which was left with him as a relic of his last battle but declares this is now all O. K. and that he will not be bothered.

Battling Leo Burns of Fort Bidwell will be remembered as the kid who so successfully "take 'em" as was demonstrated in his two previous encounters with Austin Rosander and Joe Rubio. His Leolets will have to be able to take plenty for Joe Dagnis from Vancouver barracks is a boy who throws lots and lot of leather. Looks like a K. O. in the near future. Eddie Morgan of Cleveland won a game by a home run in the ninth yesterday. He slammed his 18th circuit blow of the season with one out and one on base to defeat the New York Yankees, 9 to 8, and to undo the work of those more famous home run hitters, Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig.

Ruth poked his 34th homer off Milburn Shoffner, a perennial victim of the Rutland drives, in the fourth inning. Gehrig hit his 26th a moment later and another in the next inning. Bill Falk gave Morgan something of a race for the place in the spotlight by hitting for the circuit when he appeared as a pinch batsman in the sixth.

Fox Aids Athletics
Jimmy Fox also had the satisfaction of winning a ball game as the home run route. Fox connected with Guy Cantrell's delivery for No. 6 with one mate on base in the eighth and enabled the Philadelphia Athletics to defeat the Detroit Tigers, 5 to 3. Other results of this homer were to give Lefty Grove his 13th victory of the year.

The Reds were shut off by Seattle, 6 to 0, in yesterday's morning game as Lamanski hurried effectively for the Indians, but came back to take the afternoon contest, 6 to 1, with Herman Pilette on the mound, making it five out of seven games.

Winning streaks of both Hollywood and Los Angeles were punctured during the week, although the Stars squeezed out a one game margin in their week of play with Portland. The Heavyweights pounded Yds and Hulrey a 13 to 1 win in the first game yesterday, with Ortmann the winning pitcher.

Cause for a protest was found in the afternoon game by Manager Woodall of Portland when the contest was called in the sixth on account of a train schedule. Barbee's homer in that inning had just brought in four runs to give Hollywood the game, 4 to 2.

The Angels downed Oakland, 11 to 4, in the afternoon game, collecting a 9 to 1 lead on the first three innings off Craghead and Pearson. But the Oaks had clinched the series in the morning when Henderson, in his second league game, repeated his first performance of holding Los Angeles to three hits. The Oaks won, 1 to 0.

Sacramento made it four straight over San Francisco by winning 5 to 7, in the thirteenth, yesterday afternoon at Sacramento, after having downed the Seals 7 to 4 in the morning at Stockton. Bryan and Freitas were the winning pitchers in the morning and afternoon, respectively.

Tilden Accepts Davis Cup Place Against Judgment

PARIS, July 21, (AP)—William T. Tilden II told the Associated Press today that "against my wishes and better judgment I have accepted an invitation to play for the United States in the Davis Cup challenge round."

The American tennis star explained the rule regarding syndicate writing by amateur contestants had been waived to a certain extent and he would be permitted to write tennis articles for a news syndicate for the three days ending with Wednesday, July 23, but inasmuch as amateur rules forbid players in actual competition from writing articles Tilden will not report the challenge round matches on the ensuing Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Accedes to Request
He said that he had taken a place in the challenge round at the special request of Joseph W. Wear, chairman of the United States Davis Cup committee.

The decision of the American Davis Cup committee to play Tilden in the challenge round was received with satisfaction bordering on delight by French tennis officials and fans.

The French were pleased because they felt certain Cochet would defeat Tilden. They argued Borotra gave Tilden such a hard battle in England he now conceded an even chance to defeat the veteran American.

The delight of the Frenchmen came from the fact Tilden is certain to pack the Roland Garros stadium with a cheering, paying gallery.
