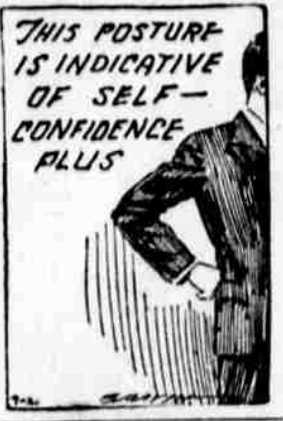


NEWS IN BRIEF

Borah Plans Two Month Rest When Senate Adjourns

WASHINGTON, July 21. (AP)—Ordered today by physicians to take a complete rest for two months, Senator Borah returned to the senate to finish the contest for ratification of the London naval limitations treaty before obeying the command.

Foregoing his daily morning horseback ride, the senator took a motorcar instead this morning and journeyed over to Baltimore to get the report of his examination made earlier in the week by officials of Johns Hopkins university hospital.

They told him his condition was not dangerous but they warned that he did not immediately take a rest of at least two months.

The veteran Idahoan was back in the senate chamber as another grueling day of debate on the naval treaty got under way. He said to his colleagues, "I guess the treaty is out of the way."

Long Island Homes Hide Wireless Sets Directing Rum Ship

NEW YORK, July 21. (AP)—Seven men were arraigned in federal court today in connection with raids on four houses in fashionable Long Island communities, where treasury agents said unlicensed radio stations were operated to direct ships bringing in bootleg liquor.

The raids were made last night at Southampton, Hampton Bays, Mattituck and Quogue, by 25 treasury department agents, federal radio engineers and deputy sheriffs from several counties.

In each instance the buildings raided were apparently the quiet homes of wealthy and respectable persons, but in three of them powerful wireless transmitting sets

found, and in most of them several guns.

The men found operating the sets and others believed involved were arrested. They were charged with conspiracy to violate both the prohibition and radio laws.

LONDON, July 21.—(AP)—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church was married at Christ church, Mayfair last Tuesday afternoon, to a Mrs. McCallum. It was made known today.

The Reverend Dr. Ferram was the officiating clergyman. None but a few intimate friends knew of the wedding at the time. Bishop Cannon and his bride now are enroute to Brazil by way of Madeira.

Rangoon Reports British Aviator In Natives' Care

LONDON, July 21. (AP)—A Rangoon dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company today said villagers near the Ball river insisted that Eric Hook, missing British aviator, was being cared for in a certain village.

The report was being investigated although floods were making the search difficult. No other trace of the aviator was

found in the region where his companion, Jimmie Matthews, said he left him after their England to Australia plane crashed more than a fortnight ago.

When Mrs. Hook, wife of the missing aviator, received at their home at West Wickman the unconfirmed report her husband's safety she displayed great joy.

"It is good news as far as it goes," she said, "and I am praying that it may be true. I have never wavered in my belief that my husband may be alive and this report has given me fresh heart."
