Miss Rogers, who is known as "Ginger," frequently is confused with the musical comedy and screen actress who bears the same name. Virginia Rogers is a former student at the University of Missouri, and a daughter of Mrs. Charles D. Rogers of Mexico, Mo.

Electrical Fee Ordinance Declared Unjust, Suit May Be Brought Against City

In compliance with the city's new electrical ordinance, \$100 license fee was paid last night by the Industrial Electric company, but not without formal protest on the legality of said ordinance and with a statement that a suit will be brought to test the legality and recover the license paid.

In a letter from E. L. Hill, president of the company, which is located at 228 South Seventh street, the following nine objections to the ordinance were cited:

Cite Objections—First—It is in restraint of trade and business and tends to create a monopoly and lessen competition. Second—It is double taxation as the state of Oregon now licenses electrical contractors. Third—It is unequal taxation. Fourth—Big Lakes Lumber company, Evans Box company, the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, the California Graph company, the California Oregon Power company and others employing electrical workers are not required to comply with the ordinance.

Fifth—The ordinance attempts to impose a tax for revenue only and not an occupation tax. The tax collected under this ordinance is not devoted to the expense incident to carrying out provisions as in addition is imposed an inspection fee.

Declared Too High—Sixth—The power to impose a license or privilege tax for revenue in pursuit of business or occupation does not exist in the city by virtue of conferred powers solely for police purposes.

Seventh—The tax imposed is too high. It is confiscatory and unreasonable, is beyond the cost of administration and expense of issuing said licenses and no inspection of work is furnished.

Eighth—The ordinance does not recite that a emergency exists to protect welfare. Furthermore, the ordinance is uncertain as to the time the fee shall be paid after passage of the ordinance the first year.

Question Police Power—Ninth—The police power of the city extends to the protection of lives, health, comfort, welfare, safety and quiet of all persons and to protection of all property. It is a general rule that to justify an ordinance licensing particular occupations as proper exercise of the power, it must appear that requirements of such licensing tends to promote this protection. In other words, the law will not allow the right of property or business to be invaded under the guise of police regulations for the benefit of public health and good order, when it is manifest that such is not the object or the purpose of enactment. No attempt is shown that the ordinance is for the regulation under police power.

This is the first complaint the council has had on the ordinance which was drawn up and passed upon petition by a group of city electricians. It was stated at the meeting that Mr. Hill also signed this petition. The license was granted to the Industrial Electric company.

Repair Estimate Presented—The city engineer's estimate for making repairs on Nevada and Oregon avenue from Front street to Bienn street, including ditching, installing culverts, patching holes and redressing macadam sections where surface is badly abraded, at a total cost of \$715 was presented. The street committee was authorized to confer with the engineer's office on the proposed repairs. "Cosmetic" Ordinance Passes—The ordinance making it unlawful to practice cosmetic therapy outside a regularly established shop was adopted after members of the council were satisfied that the ordinance does not prevent an operator who holds a position in a shop from doing work in a private home. Councilman Van Camp thought prices charged by the shops might be regulated, but the city attorney stated these could not be governed through an ordinance.
