DRIVE AROUND LAKE POPULAR

CRATER LAKE, Ore. (Special)—One of the side trips that is rapidly becoming popular among the park visitors is the drive around the rim of the lake, a distance of about 35 miles.

Between the lodge and the Diamond Lake road, a distance of approximately 6 miles, several wonderful views of the lake can be obtained. While climbing the grade around Watchman peak the visitor is able to have a wonderful, clear view of the upper Rogue river valley around Union Creek at one point, and also a scenic view of the Klamath valley. Mt. Shasta and Mt. McLaughlin can also be seen at one point near the Watchman.

At the Junction of the Diamond Lake road and the rim road, the highway is built back of the Lion rock and does not come in sight of the lake until Pumice Point is reached about 4 1/4 miles farther on. Then, for a distance of 11 miles, the visitors are practically within sight of the lake all of the time until Kerr Notch is reached. This is the lowest point of the rim, being about 600 feet above the water level. The visitors can obtain a striking view of the Phantom Ship from the stopping place.

Leaving Kerr Notch the road follows Sand Creek for 3 miles, where the east entrance checking station is reached.

The road then ascends Dutton Ridge and crosses Sun Creek Canyon. Here one may see Vidol Falls as it tumbles over Vidol Ridge for several hundred feet.

Crossing Vidol Ridge the traveler again reaches the park headquarters.

Crater Lake Briefs
CRATER LAKE, Ore. (Special)—A group of students, members of the school of geology from Vanderbilt University have been visitors in the park for several weeks studying the geological formation.

Recently large numbers of wild canary birds have made their appearance in the park. Authorities have explained the arrival of the birds at this time of the year as due to the warm weather. The birds are migratory and when weather reaches a temperature that suits them remain for a while.

Current Book Reviews

Laughing Boy, by Oliver La Farge. Published by Houghton Mifflin Co., Cambridge, Mass. "Tis a rich and colorful story—all turquoise and silver, hot blue skies, the desert, throbbing chants of Navajo ceremonial.

At a ceremonial dance, Laughing Boy, a warrior of the Navajo, and a master craftsman, meets and loves Slim Girl, a lovely, sophisticated product of the white man's school. Slim Girl, weary of being dragged up or dragged down into the white man's way, longs to go back to the clear-headed ways of her people, to know again the meaning of those oft-repeated phrases, "this is hohoni," the trail of beauty.

The two young Navajos run away together and at first are so happily happy. Underlying this simple happiness, however, are two widely varying influences, savagery and white man's sophistication which inevitably lead to discord.

When at last "the trail of beauty" seems to stretch ahead to be followed at will, fate, still in the guise of the white man's influence, holds one more bit of irony.

Oliver La Farge has lived among the Navajos and understands their lives, their ways, their thoughts as few white men do or could. He has written a refreshing and beautiful story, true to Navajo ideas. In a comment on "Laughing Boy," Owen Winter says, "To choose Navajo Indians as your material, to exclude the white man save for the most accidental accessory, to depend wholly on a young Navajo lover and his mate for your plot and your romantic appeal—and to bring it off—it is a most uncommon feat."

The book is beautifully written, in a delicate, simple style which sings like poetry. It is distinctly different—a book easy to read, hard to lay down.
