AMATEUR PLAY ENTERS MATCH STAGE TODAY

International Lineup Figures in Effort To Unseat Moe

CHICAGO, July 23, (AP)—The tussle for the Western Amateur Golf championship, won by the youthful Ben Moe of Portland, Ore., swept into the match play arena today with a strong, internationally-flavored field in the fight.

Facing the young champion as the fight opened over the suburbanly trapped and tree-lined Beverly Country club course were at least a half dozen campaigners able to give an argument in almost any kind of a tournament. They were the two Britons, Cyril Tolley and T. Phillip Perkins, who have won their own country's national amateur titles; Chick Evans and Johnny Lehman of Chicago, who battled to a deadlock with 147 total for the medal in the 24-hole qualifying round; Keefer Carter of Oklahoma City, former champion, and Bob McCarty, the fighting Scot from Des Moines, Iowa, who already has captured two trans-Mississippi championships in succession.

Fast Field
From the standpoint of real threats it was probably the fastest field in the tournament's 33 years of play.

Moe, spared the task of qualifying, faced an experienced golfer as his first rival in Vince Huntington of Chicago, who breezed into the qualifying bracket yesterday with a 155 total. Moe ranked a big favorite, naturally, but his game has been slightly off color since his return from the Walker cup wars in England and Huntington expected to stop his march before he got started.

Evan's come-back still was the topic of much discussion around the golf yard today. His clubs, ineffective since he captured his twelfth major golf championship in 1928, suddenly yielded to his artistry yesterday, and he added a sparkling 72, one over par, to his previous total of 75, to the Lehman for the medal. He putted well, and looked to be on his game once again.

Today's elimination program called for two 18-hole round matches, after which the battle of the fittest will enter the 36-hole matches until the championship final Saturday.

Browns and Phils Look Like Teams That Should Get Some Place—But They Fail to Do It

Two teams which sometimes look as if they might get somewhere in the major league pennant races, but which aren't doing it, are the St. Louis Browns and the Philadelphia Nationals. Both clubs are having unusual winning streaks for them, with three successive victories apiece.

Cleveland took both ends of a twin bill from the New York Yankees, 6 to 5 and 10 to 3.

The Philadelphia Athletics lost an opportunity to gain on Washington's second place team when they dropped a 6 to 5 decision to the Detroit Tigers. Although he did not pitch, George Uhle won the game when he cracked out a pinch single in the eighth to drive in two runs.

Dick Coffman's pitching turned the trick, although the Browns were again out-hit, 7-9.

The Boston Red Sox pushed Chicago down behind the Browns by joining three hits with a Chicago error to score twice in the ninth inning, and win the game, 4 to 3.

Chuck Klein Has Hitting Monopoly

NEW YORK, July 23, (AP)—Chuck Klein, clouting outfielder of the Philadelphia Nationals, has obtained a monopoly on most of the National League's hitting honors.

Latest figures show the Quaker star leading the league in batting with an average of .463; in runs with 87; in the runs batted in with 103; and in hits with 140.

In addition he is only two home runs behind Hack Wilson who sets the league pace for the circuit swatters with 29.

Paddy's Request Was to "Be Laid Out in Stadium"

CHICAGO, July 23, (AP)—The last request of P. T. (Paddy) Harmon, dreamer and builder of the world's greatest indoor sports arena, was "I hope you'll lay me out in the stadium—my stadium."

Just before he died yesterday from injuries suffered when his automobile overturned in a ditch, Harmon asked to go once more to the \$7,000,000 west side building—the highest material accomplishment of a career that started as a street lighter and included promotion of championship boxing matches, six-day bicycle races and dances.

Arrangements for his funeral, however, were held up today, pending the result of serious injuries suffered by his wife, Mrs. May Harmon, who with Dr. Thomas Brand, was in the automobile.

Thousands of youngsters and groups who as youngsters, benefited by Harmon's Christmas charities during the last 20 years, today mourned his death, as did hundreds of others who were associated with him.
