MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, July 23, (AP)—
Trade in butter and eggs has
blackened somewhat following
the brisk demand which char-
acterized it for a few days. High
grade eggs still had an appeal
for some of the trade. Prices
were fairly steady for both pro-
ducts.

Reviewing the fruit and veg-
etable situation, the Portland bu-
reau of the U. S. department of
agriculture says:

"California Bartlett pears
made their initial appearance on
the Portland market this week,
moving to retailers at \$3.00 per
box of medium to large fancy
stock. Cantaloupes are firm, with
some price advances over last
week's levels. Higher prices have
not curtailed consumption how-
ever, according to local distribu-
tors.

"Demand for loganberries on
the farmers' early market was
easier and prices dropped con-
siderably. Canners continue to
receive a few black raspberries,
but the season is virtually com-
pleted.

"Harvesting of early potatoes
—reds and cobbles—in Wash-
ington, is being completed this
week, and Netted Gems are now
being dug in limited volume.

"Receipts of tomatoes from
The Dales were the heaviest of
the season, and prices declined
to \$1.50 per box. Lemons ad-
vanced \$1.00 per box."
