Mrs. Eva Jackson who accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Carl Umbaugh of Lakeview from Lakeview to Klamath Falls, remained here visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Duncan McLean, while the remainder of the party motored on to Crater Lake and Medford. Mrs. Jackson, who is 84 years old and the grandmother of Mrs. McLean, is visiting Klamath Falls for the first time in 30 years, although she has resided in Lakeview during that time.
