MANY SCOUTS AT LAKE CAMP

The number of Boy Scouts enrolled at summer camp at Lake of the Woods rose from 50 to 80 this week with the advent of a large group from Klamath.

In addition to swimming, lessons in craftsmanship and camp work, the scouts will take several hikes into the mountains of the region. One over-night hike will be made this week to determine the strength of the boys and the latter part of next week they will be divided into groups for three three-day hikes.

One bunch of the scouts will hike to Lake Harriet, another to Mt. Pitt and Four-Mile lake and the third to the Sky Lakes country which is about a 25-mile trip. One of those in charge at the camp, J. W. Scoggins, Mer-

rill scoutmaster, Merle Swanson, Oscar Hoover, Klamath scout executive or the Medford scout executive, will accompany each group of hikers.

The cabins in the camp are being painted this week by a painter who is on the grounds and a few of the older scouts who are working for art merit badges. The buildings are being painted a forest green. The water system has been installed so the camp has hot running water at all hours. A wash-house has been constructed by the Medford scouts.

The camp has a better organized water front this year than in past seasons and a patrol is on guard at all times during swimming periods.

All parents are invited to attend the Court of Honor which is held each Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Arrangements can be made for meals providing one hour's notice is given; a charge of 50 cents a person is made. Also there are attractive spots for picnic lunches and the

scouts will be allowed to join their families for luncheon. Mail will arrive at the camp if addressed to Lake of the Woods, Oregon.

Constructing Docks At Lake o' Woods

Permanent docks are now under construction at Lake o' the Woods, according to a recent announcement made by Fred Wahl. The dock extends straight out from the shore for about 100 feet, with an arm extending to the right and center for 80 feet. An extension of 80 feet at a 45 degree angle, pointing outward, is at the end of the 80 foot projection, making space for boats to dock near the shore where they are protected.
