Although their nearest neighbors were more than 2,300 miles away, the 42 members of Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd's South Polar expedition were in constant communication with the outside world by radio. Now each of the members can relive his adventure, called "one of the most stupendous and daring feats of modern times," all over again in the thrilling film-record of the expedition, "With Byrd at the South Pole," at the Pelican theatre now.
