Southern Pacific Advertiser State In Latest Folder

Two colorful and interesting pieces of literature advertising Oregon and designed to promote tourist travel to this state, have just been published by the Southern Pacific, and many thousand copies are being distributed by this company's representatives throughout the United States.

One is a three-color broadside featuring the 100th anniversary of the coming of the first covered wagon train to Oregon. President Hoover's proclamation, calling upon all citizens of the nation to commemorate the event, is graphically displayed on the front cover. The inside pages are devoted to a large layout of Oregon scenic views together with descriptive copy. Headlines urge the reader to "follow the covered wagon to Oregon via the Shasta Route of the Southern Pacific."

Combines Scarce In Days of Gold On Pacific Coast

Seventy-five years ago a 19-year-old Michigan farm boy came west for the California gold rush. But it was a different gold he was seeking. He came out to operate his father's combined harvester that had been dismantled and shipped 'round the Horn after the 1853 harvest.

There were just five combined harvesters of the Moore-Hascall type in existence then. The reaper had appeared in Michigan to spell their doom after twenty years of development and perfecting, threshing, cleaning and bagging and their co-ordination in one machine.

Congress had refused to extend the patent after a three-session battle that filled some 15 pages of the Congressional Globe and New York had passed memorials to congress for and against the extension of the patent. Patent rights then belonged to the world, and the machine left home to seek its fortune in the west.

Big News of Day

This year, 76 harvests after Kidwell Moore rode his father's machine through 600 acres of wheat near Mission San Jose, and 84 crops since Hiram Moore and John Hascall were granted their patent on the machine, the combined harvester is the big news of the day.

Probably no one would be more surprised than those Michigan combines pioneers, who put their all into the machine, were they here to see it chasing the reaper and all its children—binders, header and thrasher—off the face of the earth after all these years. They didn't have the tractor or pick-up. Those two items would probably have put over the combine in the Middle West before the civil war. But today we have the wheat world scrambling for combines and for tractors to pull them, in order to stay in the wheat business. Surpluses, transportation and legislation all hinge on the combine's sudden rediscovery since the last war.

Hence, you may like to see our new 1936 combined harvester literature. We've been making them since California popularized them in the '80's, and have added the windrow system and pick-up in 1927, to make the machine practical about anywhere.
