MATERIALS FOR GAS COMPANY WORK ARRIVES

Installation of Forty-two Miles of Line Planned

Materials for the installation of gas mains and a plant in Klamath Falls has been arriving fast the past few days and work is being pushed on the completion of the system which is being installed to serve all parts of the city and its additions. J. R. Donovan, field representative for the Natural Gas Corporation of Oregon, subsidiary of the Standard Oil company of California, announced last night.

Seventeen carloads of pipe, over 42 miles of line, have arrived and been unloaded on South Sixth street. The pipe is in 10, 8, 6 and 2-inch sizes. Six more car of material are on their way here, he stated.

Site Purchased
A site for the plant has been purchased from the Great Northern Railway company in its industrial site section, east of the Klamath river. Approximately two acres of land have been secured.

Wrap Pipe Here
The company is planning on furnishing the service to several other Oregon communities, it was learned.

All the pipe will be wrapped here in a covering which protects it from soil or water corrosion. The pipe is known as "National Seamless Tubing" and is made of steel welded and seamless. It has been tested to withstand 800 pounds pressure per square inch.

System One of Best
When the system, which is now being installed, is completed, Klamath Falls will have one of the best natural gas distribution plants and systems on the "Pacific coast," Mr. Donovan said last night.

Construction of the plant will follow the laying of the mains.
