INSANITY PLEA

Defendant Recites Life
Story to Show His
Mental Status

He stated that for a time, because of a spinal meningitis epidemic, it was necessary for him to work day and night and that this brought on his disability. After receiving medical attention at the government's hospital, he was discharged.

He also told of his wanderings from city to city, of being at various times in government hospitals and of drawing compensation. He stated that he was nervous, had spells when his memory was a blank, and could not stay on one job long at a time. In Tacoma, he started a box factory. He stated that he then came to Portland under an assumed name, and did not know how he got there. He said he never went back and did not know whether his box factory, which some months did so much as \$6,000 in business, was running now or not. He came to Klamath Falls in August, 1929, and met Huff for the first time during a "pan" game in a Chilcoquin pool hall.

Retraces Life Story

This morning he retraced the story, adding a few details here and there and telling mainly of the fight which occurred on February 19, when Huff attacked him and took \$30. The matter was later introduced in justice court and Huff was bound over to the grand jury. Cahill stated that witnesses told a "pack of lies" about him at the trial at that time, and since that time he had carried a gun for self protection, believing that some people might be unfriendly toward him if they believed what was told.

Huff Hired Fighter

Huff, he stated, had incited a laborer called Hicks to aggravate him and start a fight. Hicks, Cahill stated, had a few free drinks given to him by Huff and started to fight Cahill in the pool hall. Cahill evidently fought back in good style, but later purchased Hicks and a few of the boys cigars to straighten things out. "Anything to prevent another fight," as he told the jury, Cahill also stated that Hicks said Huff urged him to start the fight in an effort to find out where he (Cahill) lived in order that Huff could "bump him off."

This testimony was carefully cross-questioned by the state's attorney, T. H. Gillenwaters, who drew out of Cahill another statement partially retracting it. Cahill then remarked that Hicks didn't tell him that in exactly the same words, but nevertheless that was what he meant.

Heard Frowner

On the night before the shooting occurred Cahill stated that he heard footsteps outside his cabin, which was located near the railroad tracks, and surmised they were Huff's. He was afraid to go out and see, however, but the incident frightened him so that he acquired a gun for self-protection.

On the morning of March 23, Cahill stated, he went to church, but it didn't make him feel any better. He acquired a gun, and started down to the other end of town for "target practice." The gun he carried in his left vest pocket to protect his heart and for self defense. Diverting from the usual custom of going to the river for target practice, he decided to go to the other side of town, through the business section of Chilcoquin, and past John's pool hall, where he saw Huff enter. Cahill walked into the pool hall, and seemed to think that Huff was watching him all the time.

Forgot Shooting Details

Cahill could clearly remember details up to that time, but stated his memory failed him from that point on. Witnesses stated, however, that he shot twice, one shot entering the back and the other entering the front. Both shots counted.

Cahill claimed that the statement that he made to the sheriff later, when he said "I made both shots count," was based on the remarks he heard, and not from what he remembered.

Cahill proved to be quite a philosopher in some of the statements he made relating to the cause of the crime, and how he felt about it. He stated that Huff was attempting to be a "small town hero" in Chilcoquin. "Some circumstances now existing in Chilcoquin should be prevented, since an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," he remarked.

Laughs at Remarks

Cahill laughed at some of the remarks made to him by Deputy District Attorney Gillenwaters, and remarked that the same questions were asked him time and time again, and that they should be clear.

The next witness called was

William T. Mirandi, who was a character witness, and testified that Cahill seemed mentally unbalanced. One instance he cited was when the defendant had tried to tell him something two or three times, threw up his hands in evident disgust, and walked away. Cahill seemed to have a mania for crashing dances, the witness remarked. At one time he crashed into a dance, started dancing all by himself, and then later took off his coat, turned it inside out and put it back on.

Ed Dorian, Chilcoquin automobile salesman, testified that Cahill at one time had a big idea of organizing a huge finance corporation and go into co-partnership with Dorian to make it tough for General Motors. Dorian stated he thought Cahill was mentally unbalanced, but not dangerous.

Doctor Analyzes Case

Dr. J. R. Barr, witness for the defense, who has made a careful study of the mental and nervous system, made a diagnosis of Cahill and reported that he suffered from strange hallucinations, and was not responsible for voluntary acts at times when he was under a delusion. "The patient would have no memory of the act committed when he was in such a state of mind," the doctor stated. His mental status of mind would prevent him from knowing the difference between right and wrong.

The prosecuting attorney attempted to shatter the doctor's testimony by attempting to put across to the jury that Dr. Barr's limited knowledge of the matter would not prove the man's insanity.

Indications of this form of insanity, the doctor pointed out, were moving about from place to place, a restless, nervous nature, no regret of the action committed, a feeling that the crime was justified and premeditation of the act.

The fact that the crime was premeditated, it was pointed out, did not mean that the patient was in his right mind at the time but that he was plotting and planning under a delusion.

The state attempted to prove that the delusion was based on a fact and therefore was not a delusion, and that the crime was the same as if committed by a man mentally sound.

Doctor's Report Allowed

A report of July 1, 1930, the nearest to the homicide, made by Dr. J. N. Perkins, was allowed in the testimony today and was presented by Dr. Perkins himself who was subpoenaed and called from Portland.

Dr. Perkins stated that the examination was made from examination and from criminal records and proved that Cahill was afflicted with dementia precox of the perceptive type, a malady which affects the mentality of the person and causes him to change his personality, to be irritable and faint finding and have a tendency toward committing petty and major crimes for which he was irresponsible. A delusion appears to be a reality to such a person and to give him an exaggerated opinion of his own ability.

Ten Women in Race

Ten women sought seats, but Arnes C. MacPhail, the first woman to enter Canada's House of Commons, alone was elected. She has held her district since 1921. The tenure of office of MacKenzie King, educated at Harvard, has been featured by cordial relations with the United States. Legislators were established at Washington and Ottawa. Only a few months ago exportation of liquor to the United States was forbidden.

E. C. Drury, former prime minister of Ontario and advocate of prohibition, failed to win a seat in yesterday's voting. In the campaign the conservatives attacked the countervailing duties against the United States imposed by the Dunning budget on the ground they were not sufficient retaliatory against the new United States tariff. The New Zealand treaty of the Liberal government was attacked as permitting an influx of great quantities of dairy products to compete with Canadian products.

three years ago a sand freighter broke in two during a storm at about the location where the men were picked up this morning. Six of its crew were drowned.

None of the rescued could say what had happened to the George J. Whalen, which was loaded with limestone, and was on its way from Kelley's Island to Tonawanda, N. Y.

Remained Afloat

The rescued men said the boat remained afloat upside down for at least half an hour after overturning, and many members of the crew were able to stay on top of it until it suddenly dropped from sight, pitching them into the water.

In addition to asserting he gave testimony damaging to Mooney and Billings at the time of the bombing because he was "induced to do so," MacDonald admitted he had been drinking considerably a year or two before the event. This was brought out in questions regarding his habits.

Tells What He Saw

MacDonald told of leaving his room, leaching on Third street and strolling down to Market and Stewart where he paused to watch the parade which was just starting.

From here he described in detail what he said he saw in connection with the explosion.

R-100 HEADS
ACROSS OCEAN

Greatest Dirigible On
Way From Ireland
To Montreal

VALENTIA, Ireland, July 29 (AP)—The wireless station here at 4:15 p. m. (11:18 a. m. EST) received the following radio from the British dirigible R-100: "Now 205 miles west of Malin Head, bound for Montreal."

The dispatch from the R-100 definitely placed the airship upon its westward journey. The point of Malin Head is 10 miles northeast of Londonderry, which is on the northern coast of Ireland.

Valentia is one of the numerous coast cities on the southern and eastern coast having wireless stations. Several lines of trans-Atlantic cable have terminals here.

The R-100 has a cruising radius of 4,000 to 6,000 miles; a full speed of 82 miles an hour and a cruising speed of 72; capacity for 5,150,000 cubic feet of buoyant gas and lifting power of 155 tons.

For this flight the airship carries 2,000 pounds of food, divided into three days' ordinary rations, and one day's reserve ration, with an added supply for emergency. Even chewing gum, which has never obtained the foothold in Great Britain it has in the United States, is included. The water supply for drinking and washing is 500 gallons.
