PIRATES LOOK FORMIDABLE AS LEAGUE THREAT

Loss Chance at Pennant But Leaders Mustn't Grow Careless

The Pittsburgh Pirates have their full share of grief and more at the start of the 1930 season and are pretty well out of the National league pennant race. But they are on top of the second division and the least slip on the part of their leading rivals will place them among the first four clubs before the season ends.

Since Lloyd Waner got back into form, the Pittsburgh club has been looking better right along. The Pirates have won nine of their last 15 games, equalling the Brooklyn Robins and of the New York Giants. The Chicago Cubs have bettered that 15 game mark by one victory.

The Pirates placed themselves only two games out of the first division yesterday with a rather impressive 6-5 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

CHICAGO, July 30, (AP)—The ladies' day nightmare has William Veck, president of the Cubs, hanging on the ropes again.

Wallowa Marble To Be Worked in Portland Factory

PORTLAND, July 30 (AP)—Announcement is that a three million dollar cement plant will be established here was made late yesterday by officers of the Wallowa Lime and Cement company, owners of property including Marble mountain in Wallowa county. The plant will employ 300 men. It will be located on Tidewater.

Lewis H. Mills of the Tidewater Timber company is president of the cement company. Other officers are Walter J. Burns, Balfour-Guthrie company, vice president; I. L. Webster, secretary-treasurer. Directors are A. S. Kerry, timberman, Seattle; Dr. Euclides K. Scott and R. Green.

Work Starts Soon

Construction is expected to start within three or four months.

Dr. Scott said the company controls 6000 acres of patented land in Wallowa county, in the center of which is Marble mountain, containing millions of tons of marble.

This marble will be quarried, shipped to Portland by rail, and will be manufactured into cement, burned lime, paper rock for paper mills, nitrate, fertilizer materials and other products.

Ty Cobb Will Never Don a Baseball Suit to Play Again

Georgia Peach Always Said He Would Quit in Top Form and Intends to Stay Quit, Now That He is Out.

ATLANTA, July 30, (AP)—Ty Cobb, a dominant figure in baseball for more than 20 years, is resting quietly at his home in Augusta, Ga., satisfied with the part he played and not overly anxious to get back.

"I'm enjoying a well-earned rest and I like it," he said when visiting his mother here. "Maybe some time the desire to re-enter the game will become strong again. Then I'll look around. When a good proposition comes perhaps I'll be ready to accept it, but I won't play any more."

Never Play Again

"You'll never hear of Ty Cobb again as a player. I still can play, but I always said I'd quit while I was at the top and I'm not going back on that promise."

Electric Icing Cost Lowered by General Motors

Hundreds of thousands of families that have been waiting for electric refrigerators to become cheaper will be interested in the announcement that Frigidairo corporation, a subsidiary of General Motors, has entered the low price field with an all-porcelain finished model at a factory price of \$157.50.

The new model is finished in gray porcelain, inside and out, and is built to standard specifications with many new features, according to a factory announcement. It has four and one-half square feet of shelf space; enough, it is said to hold the daily milk and meat requirements of a family of eight.

"Anticipated demand from a new class of purchasers, lower overhead, cheaper copper and other raw stocks and many production economies that have been instituted now make it possible to bring electric refrigeration within reach of hundreds of thousands to whom price has been a barrier in the past," said E. G. Biechler, president and general manager.

"While approximately only 3 per cent of the existing domestic refrigeration market has been sold, millions of average income families are fully familiar with the advantages of mechanical refrigeration. Many, we believe, have been waiting for a responsible manufacturer to offer them a reputable product at a popular price."

The new model has an ice freezing capacity of 2 1/2 pounds, an accessible cold control, tightly enclosed mechanism and satin finished nickel-plated hardware. A second model, one size larger, selling at \$19 more, was also announced. Both are in the hands of dealers, available for immediate delivery.

A flexible ice tray to expedite removal of ice cubes, was also announced. It will be available for present Frigidairo users, the announcement said.

The Boston Braves found an easy solution to the puzzle of Dazzy Vance's pitching after it baffled them for six innings. With Ray Phelps on the mound, they bunched three more hits in the ninth inning to beat the league leading Brooklyn Robins, 4 to 3.

The Reds continued to display their mastery over the Chicago Cubs, and kept Chicago from gaining on Brooklyn, by winning the series final, 4 to 3. Old Kippa Rixey had a fairly easy time of it except for Hack Wilson's 33rd home run of the year, which put the Cubs into the running. It was the ninth time the Reds have beaten Chicago in 15 games this season.

This double defeat of the leaders worked in favor of the third place New York Giants, who trounced the Phillies by an 11 to 5 score.

Yanks Humble Champs

With Washington idle and the Philadelphia Athletics held in subjection by Henry Johnson, the New York Yankees made the day's big gain in the American league race with the Cleveland Indians trailing in their wake.

The Yankees' triumph in the world's championship by a 12 to 3 count as Lou Gehrig's biting shty seconded Johnson's pitching.

The Athletics made only seven hits while Gehrig alone made four, including his 36th and 31st home runs of the season. Lou was credited with batting in six runs.

The Indians combined 13 hits with a burst of wildness on the part of Guy Cantrell while the Detroit Tigers failed to find many effective combinations for the same number of blows. The final count was Cleveland 14, Detroit 7.

The Chicago White Sox failed to equal such bursts, but they put over four runs in the fifth inning and defeated the St. Louis Browns, 5 to 2.

The veteran National league hurler signed with the American association club last night and promised to report for immediate duty.
