An Unusual History Book at U. of O.



Here is what may prove to be one of the most valuable "histories" in any collection at the University of Oregon. Seated on the left is Prof. O. F. Stafford, chemistry department, and right, Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism. This is the bottom section from one of the submerged Clear Lake trees, recently rescued by men of the United States forest service. The trees were probably submerged at the last lava flow from the craters in the Three Sisters region. If other trees in the same region can be found which date back to corresponding growth rings, it is hoped that a "bridge" may be constructed which may give the exact year of the last volcanic action in this section.

NEW LIGHTS TO BE INSTALLED ON KLAMATH

Avenue Will Vie With Main St.; Project to Cost \$25,000

A sub-contract for the construction of the Klamath avenue lighting system has been let by the California Oregon Power company to the Link River Electric company, it was announced Tuesday. Active work on the unit was started Tuesday morning, and, according to W. D. Butler of the Electric company, will be going forward in full blast by this noon. J. C. Roberts, a specialist on street lighting, is in active charge of the work.

Light Nine Blocks

Starting from Second street and working toward Eleventh, ditches are being prepared for the laying of the electric cables. Cement is then laid over the top of the cables.

Some of the material has not yet arrived, but it is not held up the entire job is expected to be completed within 30 days, Mr. Butler has stated.

The unit which is one of the first of its kind to be installed in the city will cost between \$24,000 and \$25,000. An ornamental lighting system will be used which will do much to enhance the appearance of the street which is fast becoming a main business thoroughfare.

Vie With Main Street

Action on the unit was started last week by businessmen on the avenue and was pushed rapidly with all of them co-operating, and with petty grievances as is usual in such an improvement, relegated to the outside. The many electric signs already installed along this street and the new lights will make the avenue as bright as Main street and will give it a more uniform appearance.

Roadway drive has ornamental street lights and was the first street in the city to be so lighted.

The street runs through a fine residential district being built up by Luke Walker, well known contractor of this city.
