

GORE STAGING COMEBACK IN SENATE RACE

Blind Oklahoman Runs Wrightman Neck And Neck Race

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 30. (AP)—T. P. Gore, blind former senator, who dropped out of the political world for a year, only to stage a spectacular comeback, and Charles J. Wrightman, millionaire old man of Tulsa, today were racing neck and neck for the lead in the contest for the democratic senatorial nomination in Oklahoma.

As returns came in from yesterday's primary, it became apparent that Gore and Wrightman would be forced to battle it out for the nomination in the run-off primary August 12.

Murphy for Governor
A victory of early Oklahoma politics, W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murphy, who came back from Bolivia only recently, after an unsuccessful attempt to establish a colony, was running so far ahead of his nearest opponent for the democratic nomination for governor that his friends claimed a run-off would not be necessary when the complete vote was counted.

Murphy had nearly a 2 to 1 vote over his nearest opponent, Frank Buttram, Oklahoma City oil millionaire, who only this year entered politics. E. B. Howard, former congressman of Tulsa, who had shifted throughout the night for third place with M. E. Trapp, former governor, was in third place again today.

"railroaded" to prison because of their activities on behalf of organized labor. A street railway strike was in progress at the time of the bombing.

MacDonald was questioned four hours and insisted he was telling the truth and branded his testimony in the Mooney-Billings cases as "a bunch of lies" which former District Attorney Charles M. Fickert and Captain (then sergeant) Charles Goff of the San Francisco police influenced him to tell.

The examination was conducted by Associate Justice John W. Preston, who piled MacDonald relentlessly with questions.

Overcome by Tears
MacDonald frequently was overcome by tears. The witness, obviously ill, spoke most of the time in a low voice even members of the court, seated on either side, could hardly hear. Frequently the court reporter was asked to repeat his answers.

At the close of the ordeal, he admitted to the question of Edwin V. McKenzie, Billings' attorney, that the true and the false regarding details of the bombing outrage were so confused in his memory he found it hard to distinguish between them.

Repeated attempts and carefully phrased questions failed to shake his declaration the police prosecuting authorities had influenced him in his identification in 1916 of Billings and Mooney and in his subsequent testimony against them.

of \$50,000 for the bridge, which would extend over the river from Klamath avenue to serve Southern Pacific industrial property, and also for a rail trestle to be built in the vicinity of the bridge and to be used for trains.

The proposed bridge, if built, would be followed by opening up of 200 acres of industrial sites on the west side of the river which are owned by the Southern Pacific and on which \$200,000 expenditure for spur lines, improvements, etc., has already been authorized.

Definite announcement will probably be made in the near future.

Livestock Train Improves Service To South Market

J. K. Frye, general livestock agent for the Southern Pacific, is in Klamath Falls today conferring with C. M. Biggs, local freight and passenger agent of the company. Mr. Frye was here about a month ago primarily to arrange a Klamath stock extra which is now running regularly three times a week with excellent results.

34 Hours to Bay
The train leaves Klamath Falls at 5 p. m. with stock assembled from all tributary points of Klamath and from the Willamette valley, and make a 34-hour run straight through to San Francisco without unloading. This prevents shrinkage of stock and enables shippers to get their product to the southern district in much better condition.

Often in 38 Hours
Recently 23 cars of lambs, including 3500 spring arrivals, were loaded at Haverdome, California. The lambs were all Klamath basin products and were shipped to Lovelock, Nev., in 15 hours and 45 minutes, then on to Ogden, Utah, in 23 hours and 15 minutes, making the total distance in 38 hours, whereas it formerly took three days. Only 3 of the 3500 lambs were lost in course of shipment.

Aged Man Dies of Deep Stab Wound

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30. (AP)—Fred Schulz, 72, died at a hospital here today from a deep stab wound just below the heart.

Hospital authorities said they were at first informed by members of Schulz' family his only injuries were superficial ones suffered in a fall down the basement stairs at 4:30 a. m.

But when the injured man was taken to the hospital surgery the knife wound was discovered. It caused his death.

Detectives immediately placed all members of the Schulz family under observation.

PORTLAND, July 30. (AP)—Fred Schulz, 72, who died in a hospital here today from a deep stab wound near his heart, died by his own hand, the coroner announced several hours after investigation of the stabbing began. He had been in ill health.

Standing at the head of the basement stairs, Schulz plunged the knife into his chest and fell to the bottom of the steps.

MONTREAL, July 30. (AP)—Past the halfway mark on the flight to Montreal, the British dirigible R-100 has broken contact with Cardington, England, her home port, and established radio communication via Louisville, N. E., radio station with St. Hubert airport, her destination.

From now until the dirigible settles to rest, Lieut.-Commander A. R. Pressey, R. C. N., will receive frequent weather reports advising what lies ahead in wind, rain or shine, or visibility.

The winches, electrically operated, that will draw the nose of the dirigible to the socket at the top of the specially built mooring tower, are in readiness with a trained ground crew of 30 to moor the airship.

JURY CONVICTS CHILOQUIN MAN

Verdict of First Degree Murder Reached in Cahill Case

doing. The state allowed, however, that Cahill might be mentally weak at times.

Arguments Closed Tuesday
Completion of testimony and the final arguments of the state and defense attorneys were given yesterday and the court was recessed shortly before 4 p. m. to allow Judge Duncan to prepare the instructions.

Judge Delivers Instructions
Judge Duncan took 30 minutes to deliver his carefully outlined instructions to the jurors.

He told them that the presumption of innocence should favor a man until he is proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. He also asked them to carefully weigh all evidence and testimony presented during the trial before they brought back one of four verdicts.

The possible verdicts in the case are first degree murder with the supreme penalty which in this state is hanging; let degree murder with a recommendation of life imprisonment; manslaughter or not guilty for reason of insanity.

Made Terms Clear
The judge went over parts of the case so that they were understandable to the jurors. He particularly instructed them in the matter of the defense plea of insanity giving them both the state and defense sides of the question. He also defined several of the technical and medical terms which were repeatedly used by both state and defense throughout the trial so that the meaning of the terms would be absolutely clear.

The verdict weighed on whether or not Cahill was capable of knowing the difference between right and wrong when the act was committed.

Requirements of the law governing the five various verdicts possible in such a case were cited by Judge Duncan before he excused the jurors. They were escorted into the jury room by Bailiff Mattoon at 10:05.

Cahill's defense has been that of insanity coupled with attacks by Huff, or thought by Cahill to have been instigated by Huff, and a fear of the prize fighter.

In opening the closing argument for the state yesterday afternoon, Deputy District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters summarized testimony given for the state and then attacked the insanity defense by saying that it had not been proved by the defense that Cahill was suffering delusions at the time of the homicide and that if Cahill was not suffering from delusions at that time that he was acting in a lucid period and would know right from wrong. Gillenwaters admitted that Cahill might be

partially unbalanced but questioned the degree.

Stanley Jones, defense counsel, opening the defense closing argument, said that the defense had based its proof on evidence and records which went back for several years and not on the mental condition of Cahill since the shooting.

Insanity Is Charged
"We have brought in proof that to our minds is conclusive. No conclusive evidence is obtainable as to the condition of Cahill's mind at the exact time," Jones stated after referring to the United States Veterans' bureau hospitalization records.

U. S. Balentine, for the defense, summarized the evidence of the defense in detail and covered the points of evidence as given by defense witnesses. He stated that Cahill was laboring under a delusion that he was being persecuted, that his life was in danger and that, being mentally unbalanced, he was not responsible for his acts and should not be by the jury.

SALEM, Ore., July 30. (AP)—The certificate of nomination of Phil Metschan of Portland as Republican candidate for governor, by the state central committee in Portland last Saturday, was filed with the secretary of state today, together with Metschan's acceptance. The certificate is filed by Floyd Cook as chairman and Harold Warner as secretary of the meeting.

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ings, foreign consulates and residences on an island in the Yangtze river adjoining the walled city. Among these were the offices of the Standard Oil company of New York and the Texas company, and the British consulate.

Tremendous stocks and installations of the two oil companies on the outskirts of the city also seemed destined for destruction.

Foreigners Leave
Most of the foreigners left the city yesterday on British, American and Japanese gunboats. Because the river was receding rapidly the gunboats were forced to withdraw, leaving millions of dollars worth of foreign property unprotected.

No word had been received today of the fate of four missionaries believed to have remained in the city. They were the Rev. W. H. Ling, of the Presbyterian board of foreign missions; Dr. Allen N. Cameron, representative of a branch of the Galilee Baptist church of Denver, Colo.; Miss Gertrude Rugg, a British woman of the China inland mission, and an Italian Catholic priest.

Whether there had been loss of life among the foreign inhabitants was not known, but about

hilly were removed on the gunboats before sacking of the city commenced.

Reds Swarm In.
The Reds swarmed into the virtually defenseless city yesterday. What resistance they met they easily overcame. Numerous national and provincial officials were executed. A brother of Ho Chien, provincial governor, was beheaded, but the governor himself escaped.

Ho Chien's movements were not available here, but it was believed he was to return to Shanghai soon. Communist leaders announced they would behead him immediately should he fall in their hands.

Local influential Chinese contended Nanking authorities should seek to extend definite military assistance to the stricken city. Otherwise, they say, the future strength of the Reds will be materially and morally enhanced.

Invaders Well Organized
Movements of provincial forces, first reported moving against Changsha from the north, were unknown today. That these forces would attempt to drive the communists from the walled city was considered unlikely since the invaders have a better organized army than the military.

Changsha is considered one of the richest and most modern of interior China cities. It has a population of nearly a million and is considered one of the cleanest cities of the nation.

A Changsha dispatch received here said all foreign properties in the Hunan capital except the Yale in China university hospital and post office had been burned. This was taken to mean the

communists had destroyed that portion of the institution devoted to education.

Communists posted notices offering \$200 reward for the capture of each foreigner, Chinese official or foreign employed Chinese in Changsha. The Communists want such persons primarily for ransom as they are considered able to raise large sums of money for their release.
